While at the Academy, Brandon participated in military training, interplatoon athletics, engineering challenges and projects, small boat handling, physical fitness training and leadership development. 

An Update on the Boston Logan Airport Noise Study Submitted by Bob D'Amico

The departure track from Runway 4R was designed to take aircraft over the Nahant Causeway and not fly over the town. As we all know, there are times when this does not happen. During Phase 1, the FAA designed a new flight track, that would improve the noise impact on Nahant residents. The aircraft would still turn at 4 miles from Logan, but would use a different air traffic control procedure, to make the turn more accurate. This would be accomplished by new technology, involving GPS waypoints. The new track was approved by the FAA and was all set to go.

Unfortunately, after two years, just towards the end of Phase 1, the City of Revere proposed a different track off 4R (called Flight Concept F-R), that would bring the aircraft extremely close to Nahant, prior to turning over the causeway. The point was to move the aircraft away from the Point of Pine section of Revere. Should this track be put into service, the noise in Nahant will increase dramatically.

As long as a flight track does not have what the FAA calls a fatal flaw, or adds to controller work load, the FAA will study it further. That is why 2 years after approving the track that would improve noise abatement for Nahant, Concept F-R was approved at the end of Phase 1 and carried over for further study in Phase 2.

During Phase 2, 2 flight tracks will be eliminated for further study. My only hope is Concept F-R will be one of them. Please write, email, or call, your State Representative and State Senator and say you are opposed to Flight Concept F-R. Also, don't forget to call in a complaint, whenever you hear aircraft flying overhead, to Massport's Noise Abatement at 617-561-3333. I will report back to the Nahant Harbor Review, as soon as I hear any news on Concept F-R.

Finally, the good news is the Town of Winthrop is also opposed to this concept, since it will increase noise in the Highlands Section of Winthrop.

A longtime Marblehead resident, Lee Mondale, is a veteran Healthlink member. Lee is also active in the League of Women Voters and has served on the Planning Board committee. She is a gardener par excellence, as well.

Polly Bradley of SWIM (Safer Waters in Massachusetts), will introduce Mondale and offer the evening's invocation. Healthlink and SWIM work closely together on environmental issues.



Johnson School and Marine Science Center Represented at National Marine Educators Conference

Tracy Hajduk, Outreach Program Coordinator for the Marine Science Center and Meredith Tibbo, Johnson School science teacher, packed their bags and headed to steamy Savannah, GA, for a week this July. There they attended a week-long, National Marine Educators Conference, to network, hear about current marine education programs and to be inspired.

Tracy Hajduk was chosen as a presenter and spoke during her session about the success of the Coastal Ocean Science Academy, a two-week summer program for high school students. Several Nahant students have participated in this multiple-year program that introduces students to local marine ecosystems and current marine science research.

Meredith Tibbo was given the opportunity to attend the conference through the generosity of the Center for Ocean Science Education Excellence (COSEE) – New England, a group based out of the New England Aquarium, that strives to connect teachers, informal educators and scientists. Meredith was first introduced to this organization, when she and several other Johnson School teachers, participated in a 5-day workshop at the Marine Science Center last summer, that was funded by COSEE.

Meredith Tibbo said of the experience, "During this experience, I was given endless opportunities to interact and share ideas, not only with other science educators from throughout the country, but with marine scientists from around the globe, as well. Basketball Options for Nahant Youth Players 2008-09 Submitted by Paul Caira

In response to many inquiries about the upcoming youth basketball season, we would like to update Nahant parents and players on a few of the 2008/09 options, that are sponsored by various organizations, including the Nahant Youth Basketball League, St. Thomas CYO, St. John's CYO and others, as noted below. For planning purposes, you might want to note the applicable grade eligibility requirements of each league and plan accordingly. For additional information, please call NYBL, Attn. Paul Caira, at 781-581-0015, or e-mail info@saca.com.

Nahant Youth Basketball League (NYBL)

- 1. Boys in Grades 9-12: NYBL will run its usual 20-game season, plus double elimination playoffs, beginning mid-November and ending in mid-March. All Nahant and Swampscott boys and girls, in grades 9-12, are eligible to sign up. Registration forms will be mailed in October. The schedule calls for teams to play two games a week, on weekends, with no weekday practices. It is a recreational league and all players are guaranteed equal playing time. Coaches are chosen from volunteers, games are refereed by certified refs and games are played at the Johnson School gym. Estimated cost is \$200 per player.
- 2. Boys & Girls in Grades 2-5: Usually we split the players up into two groups 2nd & 3rd grades and 4th & 5th grades – and they each have a 1-hour clinic/game session on Saturday and Sunday mornings, beginning mid-November thru mid-March, at the Johnson School gym. Registration forms for those who played last year, will be mailed out in October, but new players need to call NYBL for registration information. Estimated cost is \$85.

St. Thomas CYO Basketball

- 1. Boys in Grades 9-12: St. Thomas will again sponsor a high school team for boys, in grades 9-12, for an 18 game season. Home court location has not been decided, but away games are played throughout North Shore communities on Saturdays and Sundays. Players interested need to call Paul Caira at 781-581-0015, or e-mail info@saca.com. Estimated cost is \$150.
- 2. Boys in Grades 5-8: It's possible for St. Thomas to enter two teams in the North Shore CYO program. One level would be 5th & 6th grade boys, combined to form a Bantam team and 7th & 8th grade boys, to form a Cadet team. In order to do this, a minimum of 9-11 boys in each division is needed and players should plan on at least one practice during the week and play a schedule of 18 games – 9 home and 9 away, with the away games played throughout North Shore communities on Saturdays and Sundays. All practices and home games would be at the Johnson School gym. Presently these teams do not exist, but if there are parents willing to organize and coach at either the Bantam, or Cadet level, your assistance in organizing these teams would be required. Call Paul Caira. Estimated cost is \$175 per player.
- 3. Girls in Grades 7-8 and 5-6: St. Thomas will join with St. John's of Swampscott to develop and form both Cadet and Bantam teams (Cadets are 7th & 8th graders and Bantams are 5th & 6th graders) and a joint tryout will be held early October, at the Swampscott Middle School gym. To prepare for gym space and new coaches for this coming winter season, any girls wanting to try out for either team, will have to confirm their interest by e-mailing either Tom Dawley at tomdawley@cs.com, or Paul Caira at info@saca.com. Normally, teams play one game on Saturday and one on Sunday, on a home/away schedule, with away games played throughout North Shore communities. Estimated cost is \$175 per player.

Other Leagues

1. Eastern League Basketball/ Boys in Grades 5-8

This league is run by coaches in Swampscott, whose home court is the Tower School gym, in Marblehead. Teams are grade inclusive (only 5th graders play on 5th grade team, etc.); tryouts determine skill level for assignment to an A, or B team; 2 practices per week (Mon and Wed) and a 20 game season, with 10 home and 10 away (Georgetown, Ipswich, Saugus, Peabody, etc.). Estimated cost is \$150 per player. Eastern League website is www.easternhoopleague.com, but registration would be thru a Swampscott coach contact.

2. YMCA/AAU: Lynn YMCA and Marblehead YMCA run basketball programs as does the Mass. Renegades (AAU) and you will need to call the respective organization for details.

Evening Lecture Series at the Marine Science Center

On Tuesday, October 21st, at 7:00 p.m., all are invited to a lecture by Dr. Donald Cheney, Associate Professor of Biology, at Northeastern University. He will talk about Seaweed Blooms: the problems they cause and their potential use as bioremediators of toxic pollutants.

Blooms of marine algae, both macroscopic and microscopic, are occurring with greater frequency today, than ever before. This talk will explore the causes and consequences of two, well-known local examples of seaweed blooms: the Pilayella problem of Nahant Bay and the Codium problem of Cape Cod. In addition, the recent discovery of a seaweed bloom in New Bedford Harbor, capable of taking up and concentrating PCBs 1000-fold, will be described and its potential use as a bioremediation agent explained.

This lecture is free to the public. Light refreshments will be served at 6:30 p.m. The lecture begins at 7:00 and is roughly an hour long. The Marine Science Center is wheelchair accessible. Willpower. If you could bottle it, it would sell millions, I'm sure. What is it? Where can I get some? So why is it that we seem in short supply? Willpower is defined as deliberate control exerted on one's own impulses, in other words, self-control. Will-power is a strength, an inner ability. Some people seem to have more than others. So what are the influencing factors to our willpower? Researchers have been studying this and found that willpower is influenced by a variety of different factors. They say it is not a personality trait, more like a muscle you can strengthen, but you can also exhaust it.

Okay, so to accomplish all the things we want to in our lives, we are always challenging our will power muscle. There are so many challenges where we must use it, to stay on budget, to keep our cool with an upset client, or co-worker, to not join in on a complain and moan session, to not lose our patience with family, to meet a deadline and the most familiar one, to maintain a healthy lifestyle of proper diet and exercise. Whenever we restrain ourselves from...or push ourselves to...we are flexing our willpower muscle.

So many people would like more willpower. So how can we stengthen this muscle? First we must decide what it is we want to change. We all want to continually evolve and better ourselves, so this could be a long list. So choose the top priorities. Look at why you want to change these things. For example: staying on budget so you can buy a house, or handling work and coworkers better, to gain a promotion. We know that eating right is important to our health, even if we are not on a diet, but trying to lose weight takes more willpower. So what is the BIG picture? Why do you want to lose weight? So you look good at a special event seems like a good goal, but is really a good target. It puts a deadline on it and may motivate you, but what about after the event? It will take more willpower to maintain your new look.

Okay so when your willpower is challenged, having the bigger picture in mind will help. Pause a moment and look at the goal. Keeping that in mind can help you exercise willpower and acheive it. You need to plan how you will deal with these situations ahead of time. Then, when the challenge arises, you can act quickly and with decision. Say you sometimes crave dessert, you plan that you have dessert once a week, on Wednesdays and if you need to satisfy a craving another day, you choose fruit or yogurt. You now know if you crave dessert on Friday, it is handled, you have fruit. Simple.

So what depletes will power? When you are physically, or emotionally stressed, tired from not enough sleep, hungry because of a skipped meal, or had a tough day at work. These are times when it will be hardest to call on your willpower to resist, or stay, on track. Your workout plan may suffer, because you feel too tired, so you skip going to the gym. Too much choice, or too many options, can also sabbotage your willpower. Plan meals ahead when you are not hungry, or tired. Shop from a list. Trying to change too many things at once may stop any of them from happening. Practice consistent actions of willpower, until it becomes easier. Acknowledge your accomplishments.

Your willpower is stronger when your mood is lifted. When you feel a challenge, call a friend, watch a movie, or do something enjoyable. Don't save rewards only for the final accomplishment, use them along the way to help you get there. Get enough sleep, laugh, treat yourself and most of all forgive yourself if you have a lack of willpower. Accept it and carry on. Don't focus on stopping something, look at the positive gain, or goal. Stay positive. Take changes gradually and you will be more successful.

The willpower muscle is fueled by physical and mental energy. Keep your body well fed and rested and your attitude positive. Keep flexing that willpower muscle and it will keep getting stronger.

Intertidal Bioblitz: exploring the natural and biological diversity of the Boston Harbor Islands national park area

Scientists, amateur naturalists and interested individuals joined forces for an Intertidal Bioblitz, on Monday, August 18, 2008, to explore intertidal diversity at Boston Harbor Islands. Six islands were sampling during the early morning low tide. Campers were deployed to Calf Island and

Outer Brewster at high tide, the afternoon before the blitz, due to limited vessel landing abilities at low tide, islands that are typically inaccessible to campers. Other professional participants were shuttled to Little Brewster, Peddocks, Grape and Langlee Islands, early in the morning. Scientists and public participants explored Thompson and Lovells Islands, during the evening low tide.

A total of 109 invertebrate, 54 algal, 30 marsh plant and 22 vertebrate species were found. Seventy-eight specimens have yet to be identified to species in the lab. The graph shows the number of each type of species found on each island sampled during the bioblitz. Data collected will guide the development of a long-term, volunteer-based




intertidal monitoring protocol, being designed by Jeremy Long (Northeastern University Marine Science Center), for the National Park Service and will also

contribute to the park's ambitious, all-taxa biodiversity inventory (ATBI), led by the Museum of Comparative Zoology at Harvard University.

The bioblitz was sponsored by National Park Service, Northeastern University's Marine Science Center, Harvard Museum of Comparative

Zoology, Boston Harbor Island Alliance, Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation and Thompson Island Outward Bound Center. The Boston Harbor Islands National Park, established by Congress in 1996, features 1,600 acres and 35 miles of undeveloped shoreline across 34 islands, all within 10 miles of downtown Boston. The National Parks Service, Department of Conservation and Recreation, City of Boston and Island Alliance are members of the Boston Harbor Islands Partnership, which coordinates management of the island park. Boston Harbor Island Alliance is a non-profit organization whose purpose is to raise public awareness and use of the Boston Harbor Islands national park area.

Quick SWIM UpdateBy Polly Bradley

Here are some of the issues being watched by Safer Waters in Massachusetts (SWIM):

- * Seventeen open meetings are being held, to get input on ocean planning, under new Massachusetts Ocean Act. All the North Shore meetings were being held on short notice, in September, and the closest one in Salem. SWIM planned to attend and/or make comments and is working on having a meeting in Nahant. This is important to Nahant, because if other areas ask for protection and we don't, you know where problematic projects will go.
- * Kudos to the Nahant Board of Selectmen for writing a letter to the state, supporting the Lower North Shore No Discharge Area. As of mid-September, similar letters were still not written by Revere, Saugus, Lynn, or Swampscott. However, the process in neighboring communities was being speeded up by Selectman Richie Lombard and Town Administrator Mark Cullinan. Again, if Nahant isn't protected, you know where boats will dump their waste.
- * SWIM is carefully watching developments along the Causeway. It looks like the road will be two lanes, both directions. There isn't room on the Causeway for a dedicated bike path, but a four-foot shoulder is planned, which will give bikers a "semi-safe haven," according to Julia O'Brien, Planning Director of the Department of Conservation and Recreation. And windmills on the lightpoles? Exciting idea! We'll see.
- * Lee Mondale, of HealthLink, will speak at the Nahant Woman's Club, Tuesday, October 14th, on "The Link between Health and the Environment." See the Nahant Woman's Club article for details.
- * Don't miss the talk on "The Good, the Bad and the Algae," by Professor Donald Cheney, at Northeastern University Marine Science Center, on October 21st, at 7:00 p.m. Don is the expert on Pilayella littoralis Nahant's flagship environmental affliction.



Winterizing your marine engines

Soon, many boat owners, myself included, need to face the ugly fact, that it will be necessary to winterize our boats against the icy blasts of a long New England winter. The discussion always comes down to this question: "Is the money you save this fall, worth the risk of facing major damage next spring, in case you missed something?" It is my opinion—and I have an opinion on just about everything marine related—that unless you really know what you're doing, leave it to the pros! That said, I have a few reminders for those of you who are still going to do it by yourself, or retain me to winterize your engines and onboard systems.

1. Change the oil and filter.

It doesn't matter if the engine has 5 or 105 hours on it, since the last change. Today's oils do not wear out, but they do get contaminated with dirt, combustion residue and acid. Leaving any of these things to settle on your engine's moving parts, during the winter, is a bad idea.

Run the engine until the oil gets warm, thus suspending all of the "bad stuff." Next, drain, or pump it out, change the filter, including a new gasket and pour in the new oil.

Caution: Do not over fill, as too much oil will cause all kinds of problems. Check the owner's manual for the manufacturer's recommendations on the type and amount of oil to use.

2. Add fuel stabilizer to your fuel and fill the tank between 3/4-and full. I only recommend a product called STAR-TRON, which can be purchased at any marine store, or Walmart. Run the engine long enough to ensure the stabilized fuel has reached your carburetor, or injectors.

Engine Winterization

3. Fogging: Fogging is accomplished by feeding a rust preventative lubricant through the carburetor, or throttle body, while the engine is running, at about 1000 to 1200 RPMs, after the engine is thoroughly warmed up. Very slowly pour in the lubricant, until lots of blue smoke comes out of the exhaust. This method will thoroughly coat the cylinders, rings, valve seats and valve stems. DO NOT pour the liquid in too quickly, or you will "choke" the engine, causing combustion knock. Besides, too much liquid, added at one time, can cause hydrostatic lock in the cylinders and this will destroy your engine! Follow the fogging oil manufacturers' instructions! **NEVER FOG FUEL-**INJECTED INBOARD ENGINES, OR OUT-BOARDS.

4. I/O Engine: If you have an I/O (inboard/ outboard), drain the lower unit and check it for any sign of water contamination a milky color instead of clear and/or any metal shavings indicate leaking gaskets and gear damage. If all looks good, refill the unit with new grease. If

not, get it repaired now! All outdrive units must be removed and inspected every other season; no exceptions.

5. Cooling Systems: Preparing your cooling system for winter depends on the type of system you have. Remember, always follow the manufacturers' instructions and use the following procedures only as a guide.

Raw Water (Direct) Cooling System. Proper winterization of a raw water system should start with a thorough flushing of the system, with fresh water running through the engine, while it is running at normal temperature. This part is REALLY important, if you have been running in salt water.

First, disconnect the intake hose from the thruhull fitting and attach it to a garden hose. Note: if you have an I/O, you'll need a set of "ear muffs" to attach to the water intake on the lower unit. Remember, running an I/O for even a few seconds without water, will destroy the impeller in the water pump!

After flushing, drain the engine block, manifolds, risers and oil coolers, by opening the petcocks on the various units. After all the water has drained out, close each petcock. Disconnect the garden hose from the intake hose and place the intake hose in some environmentally friendly ("Pink") antifreeze rated for 50-degrees below zero and drain the fluid, by running the engine. When the antifreeze starts coming out the exhaust, shut the engine down.

Now here's a very

important note: Don't forget, your engine has a thermostat! This whole procedure must be done with the engine totally warmed up and the thermostat OPEN. A closed thermostat will not allow the antifreeze to enter the block, or heads. This means the antifreeze will go through the manifolds and out the exhaust, leaving the block and heads completely void of any antifreeze. If this happens, next spring you will find a cracked engine block, or head, and find it necessary to buy a new, very expensive engine. Marine Insurance does not cover poor lay-up/ winterization damages.

Closed (Indirect) Systems: These systems do not require annual draining and flushing of the closed part of the system. HOW-EVER, the open part of the system DOES require the same procedures of flushing, draining and antifreeze-infusion, as previously described in the Raw Water (Direct) System.

Finally, some additional thoughts: If any of the above instructions seem to be confusing or over your head, that's probably the best clue that you need me to winterize your engine. Also remember, if I winterize your engines and onboard systems and something goes wrong, next spring it is my problem. If you've done your own work, you have a problem!



The Way of The Cross for the Bereaved

By Rev. Terence P. Curley

The following is taken from Father Curley's introduction to his book, "The Way Of The Cross For The Bereaved."

"When someone close to us passes away, it is as though some part of ourselves has died in the process. Our grief is often so painful, that it defies any complete description; it is intensely personal, agonizing and inescapable. It is, in every spiritual sense of the word, a crucifixion—a journey to the cross we all must make, at one time or another.

"When we grieve, our lives are turned upside-down. Chaos reigns and confusion is the order of the day. We just don't know how we're going to carry on. And so we relive the final hours together and find a need to tell our story. Very often this story has to be repeated over and over again. The story-telling is in itself a personal way of ritualizing our loss, in our efforts to come to terms with it."

By 1952, Marilyn had amassed a wealth of experience as a stage actress, having appeared in many off-Broadway productions, and as a model. She was also featured on the "Fun And Fashion Show," on WPIX-TV, New York. Marilyn also worked at The Voice of America, a government agency. Fast forward! Next was Boston! Marilyn joined WCOP Radio and hosted the popular "Young Timer's Club." Quicker than you can say Rumpelstilskin, Marilyn found her way into the hearts and imaginations of thousands of youngsters all over New England. What's more, she became the Princess of a children's show on WBZ-TV. She became the subject of many newspaper stories!

Settling in Nahant, Marilyn became active in The Nahant Garden Club. She also appeared at the Nahant Public Library, to read stories to the kiddies. She never talked about her life and times in the world of broadcasting and theater. She was the proud mother of two lovely daughters, Karen and Robyn and enjoyed becoming a grandmother! As they say, the rest is history.



Fruit Storage Building Dates Back to 1850 or Earlier



back to the 1850's or earlier, as does the brick house across the street near it, also built by Tudor, This house was occupied for years by Peter Manuel, a gardener for Tudor, who had charge, among other duties, of a green house down near the tall fenced garden between the brick house and Bear Pond. Many Nahanters remember him. An old plan of land around Cliff Street and up to Summer Street is labelled "The Great Pasture," while what is now Willow Road from Cliff Street down to Summer Street is labelled "Road leading to the Great Pasture." This plan was loaned for the preparation of these writings through the courtesy of Mr. Charles Amory. There were gates across the roads to keep the cattle in the Great Pasture from wandering easterly into the village.




Fred Tudor, no doubt, would be proud to see fruits and vegetables growing again on Calf Spring Road.

Fred Tudor's Orchards

One of Tudor's orchards in Nahant, were the apple trees covering the land now bounded by Spring Road, High Street, Coolidge road and the cemetery, including the land where now stands the Maolis Club (later becoming the American Legion Building, which was recently razed so new homes can be built).

Forty years ago this orchard still yielded a good crop of fruit, though practically neglected for many years before that. Gradually, the yield diminished, while the several houses on this tract caused the removal of many trees. A few are left. One of the new owners who built there, E.W. Bourne, took care of the half dozen trees, or more, on his lot and brought them back to be healthy and clean. The present owner, Aaron Hershenson, is also caring for them. Though they are old, doubtless proper treatment will bring a reasonable yield of fruit again, and they are still able to be an ornament to his place.


Tudor also built the old stone barn on Spring Road, (called Calf Spring Road, at the time) at the corner of High Street, which was not then, or until within a dozen, or fifteen years, cut through to the cemetery's east gates. With the widening of range roads to two rods, as is required of all town roads, a corner of the stone barn juts into the street, but the building is an old landmark and curiosity. It is hoped it may not come to an earlier end on that account. The stone wall along Spring Road, at that point, a wall which was originally extended up beyond Emerald Street, is built with the wall of the barn, as an inspection of interlocking stones will show. This barn was a fruit storage building and was never used by Tudor for any other purpose. The remains of racks for fruit storage were recently, perhaps are now, to be found there. He also used it for curing tobacco, which he tried to grow in Nahant, but without much success. In recent years, it was fitted up for use as a stable and is now used for storage only.

Causeway Going Green DCR Submits Final Plan

After a year of meetings with our Nahant residents and the philanthropic Tudor Cocktail Ice Company, the DCR (formerly the MDC), have submitted a plan that, hopefully, addresses all our concerns. Some sticking points have been narrowing to one lane and adding a crosswalk, for use by our area bird watchers at the halfway mark and the installation of a traffic signal at the Lynn end.

The plan consists of removing all blacktop from the road surface and replacing it with "organic fill," from our town compost heap. Also, the halfway Bathhouse will be replaced by a plastic replica of the original Halfway Tree made from recycled plastic bottles from Nahant's own recycling program. A main feature of the tree design will be the addition of a birdwatching "blind," to eliminate the need for the crosswalk.

In order to accommodate the narrowing of lanes, versus the traffic volume, Nahant residents will be required to dispose of all their motor vehicles, within a 2-year period. Organic fill, a bird-watching blind and no motor vehicles, the DCR concluded, would quadruple the causeway migration pattern of all our feathered friends.

It may seem like a lot to ask, but not to fear, the Tudor family is on the job. My siblings, Ophelia Payne and Ponsie have been in private meetings with the DCR, to address the transportation issue. The DCR has agreed to give a totally green, emission-free shuttle contract to the Tudor Cocktail Ice Company and its fleet of Mulooster-drawn, wooden ice wagons. The shuttle will be free for all "TRUE" Nahant Residents. This will also eliminate the need for beach parking permits, (no vehicles, no permits).

To save the cost of Causeway black top disposal, a 6' section will be donated to the Historical Society, for our descendants to view and the rest will be cut up into 18" squares for sale as memorabilia (great Christmas, or Chanukah, gifts).

The Tudor Family Giant Fund will donate a string of windmills that will give free electric power to all town residents and municipalities. The question of windmill blades and the low flight pattern of the Canadian geese that settle at the end of the Causeway, came up. We have the answer right from the Frederic Tudor Entrepreneur Handbook! Lookout France, Nahant is about to become that goose liver pate capital of the



world. That revenue, along with free electric power, should give enough revenue to support all 3,700 of us.


