Historical Society Offers Summer Internship

A temporary museum assistant position is available, starting approximately mid-May and ending in late August, 2008. This will be an outside contractor position and a 1099 will be issued at year's end. No taxes will be withheld. EOE. Additional hours are available, on a volunteer basis. This position can be used as part of a more extensive internship, in a degreed program for museum studies, history or library science, etc. This would involve more detailed work, in agreement with the successful applicant and the Curators. Marine Science Center April Lecture to be Held at Nahant Town Hall

Due to standing-room-only crowds and the generosity of the Nahant community, the next Evening Lecture Series, for the Marine Science Center, will be held in the Nahant Town Hall, on April 15th.

This lecture will be presented by Northeastern University Distinguished Professor of History, Dr. William Fowler. Dr. Fowler has written a number of books about American history, frequently with a maritime theme. He has been a chair member on numerous committees and is the past Director of the Massachusetts Historical Society. His talk, "Tell It Good Bye Kiddo: A History of the North Atlantic Fishery," will be held at 7:00 p.m., on April 15th, at the Nahant Town Hall.

It was cod that sustained New England. The "sacred cod" tied New England into a global economy, that stretched across the Atlantic. Cod, molasses, rum and slaves were the mainstay of British North America. In independence, New England fishermen ventured to the banks off Nova Scotia and farther north, seeking cod. There was, they thought, an inexhaustible supply. Five centuries after first discovering this treasure, have we finally exhausted it?

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Eat Fat? Oh No! by Sallee Slagle, Director, Dance Dimensions

We have been told that fat is bad. Don't eat foods with fat, as they will make us FAT. A low-fat diet is what has been believed as best for everyone. Well, America has believed this strongly. The food industry also has created "low-fat" foods for us to buy, but reducing the fat, also reduces the satisfaction and taste. So low-fat foods have more sugar, corn syrup and fructose, which convert to stored fat in the body, if not burned. Also, a lack of satisfaction can drive us to eat more, to feel satisfied. Since the low-fat craze began, obesity has risen dramatically. So, is low-fat really the way we should be eating? I say we need to KNOW fat.

Low-fat diets have made us fatter! It has to be well-known and understod, that not only the fat you eat, becomes fat in your body, but that ANY excess calories you eat and DO NOT burn off by activity, will be converted and stored as fat in your body. So excess carbohydrates and excess protein will make you fat, too! ANY extra calories can and will make you fatter, if you don't burn those calories off! Genetically, the body is still protecting us, as the hunter/gatherer that we once were. Your body stores these calories for you to use, at a later time, when food might be scarce. This system is set-up to keep us alive in a changing time, when food was often scarce. In modern times, food is never scarce and obesity is a national epidemic.

Fats are misunderstood. The fats and oils in our food contain a higher calorie density and so must be consumed intelligently. Some fats are healthy and others are not. Some raise our risk of heart disease, some increase our cholesterol and others lower it. So some fats are even good for you.

Let's clarify this. There are three types of fats: saturated fat, monounsaturated fat and polyunsaturated fat. The body reacts differently to saturated and unsaturated fats. Saturated fat is the worst type of fat and should be avoided. Saturated fats and oils are mainly animal based, including butter and cheese. Eating these stimulate cholesterol production in the liver, raising your cholesterol levels and as such, are the unhealthy type of fat. You should limit consumption of saturated fats. This is why many peolple limit red meat in their diet. That is a healthy choice. Lean meat is also considered healthier, as it has less saturated fat and fewer fat calories, too.

Plant-based fats and oils are not all the same. Some polyunsaturated and monounsaturated oils from plants, actually can lower cholesterol production! These are heart healthy oils include grape seed oil, olive oil, canola oil, peanut, walnut and almond oil. Corn oil, sunflower, safflower, soybean, sesame and cottonseed oils are also polyunsaturated. They do not raise, or lower cholesterol, but their structure is more unstable and likely to oxidize, which can make them a questionable choice.

Omega-3 is an essential fatty acid, that can lower your risk for heart disease, inhibit blood clots, which also aids in supporting a healthy immune system, eyes and brain function. Omega-3 also has anti-inflammatory properties, that can help ease joint pain. Where do you find Omega-3? Fish oils, flax seeds, walnuts and dark green leafy vegetables. Be sure to include these in your diet. Of course, you can also add supplements if your diet does not include fish, one to three times a week, or a handful of walnuts each day.

The biggest fat in the news today is Trans Fat and the banning of it in Boston! Yes, the vote is in and Boston restaurants will soon be Trans Fat Free! Trans fats are being found to be even more harmful than saturated fats. Trans fats may increase your risk of heart disease and breast cancer, as it can alter cell membranes. Hydrogenated or partially hydrogenated oils are trans fats. Read your labels carefully and avoid them, at all costs.

When choosing oils, the best is cold-pressed and extra virgin olive oil, is the most nutritious. Storing fats in dark containers, or even in the refrigerator, helps keep the oil fresh, as light and heat can spoil the oils more quickly. Try adding healthy fats by sprinkling fresh-ground flax seeds on cereal, or salads. Add nuts and eat avacados in your salads and sandwiches. There is more to know about fats. The news is, you don't need to avoid them completely, if you choose healthy fats!

How's the Spring In Your step? by Marc Dufour, LPTA, ROA and Jacquelyn Connolly, LPTA, cFo

The day's a little longer, the weather that much warmer, we see the crocuses and daffodils beginning to peep out of the ground. Nahant has so much to see and experience, as winter turns to long-awaited spring. It is only natural to want to get outside, make plans for the yard, get the kids moving and maybe think about ourselves a bit, too. Maybe take up some walking, biking, bird watching, whatever gets us closer to the great outdoors. Okay, so Nahant may be considered one square mile, this little spot has lots to offer, good things come in small packages. So, put down the remote and get out there, oh, and let's not forget your feet. This month the goal is to educate on something called Plantar Fasciitis; one of the leading causes of heel pain.

When your first few steps out of bed in the morning, cause severe pain in the heel of your foot, you may have plantar fasciitis. It's an overuse injury affecting the sole, or flexor surface, of the foot. A diagnosis of plantar fasciitis means you have inflamed the tough, fibrous band of tissue connecting your heel bone to the base of your toes.

You're more likely to get the condition if you're a woman, if you're overweight, or if you have a job that requires a lot of walking, or standing, on hard surfaces. You're also at risk if you walk, or run, for exercise, especially if you have tight calf muscles, that limit how far you can flex your ankles. People with very flat feet, or very high arches, are also more prone to plantar fasciitis.

The condition starts gradually, with mild pain at the heel bone, often referred to as a stone bruise. You're more likely to feel it after (not during) exercise. The pain classically occurs again, after arising from a midday lunch break.

If you don't treat plantar fasciitis, it may become a chronic condition. You may not be able to keep up your level of activity and you may also develop symptoms of foot, knee, hip and back problems, because of the way plantar fasciitis changes the way you walk. Sounds terrible right? What does this mean? Are those with foot problems destined to abandon the much-loved flip flops, crocs, or deck shoes? There are a few different solutions to ease the problem. Physical Therapy is one option. Some Podiatrists use what is called shock-wave therapy. Another quick, convenient, and successful option, is to wear custom-molded foot orthotics, in your footwear, to help the pain. How do foot orthotics work? Fabricating a custom orthotic, that is worn inside the shoe to take the pressure off the arch, as well as the metatarsal heads (the balls of your feet), will start the healing process. Wearing your orthotics consistently will decrease the inflammation in the fascia. Orthotics can be adapted to fair-weather footwear, with a little education and creativity, allowing for style, comfort and support for many outdoor activities. No More Analog TV by Joe Bukowski

On February 19, 2009, analog TV will go dark. The FCC has mandated this change, to free up the bandwidth that analog TV occupies, creating more space for security emergency systems and developing a source of revenue, when the government auctions off the abandoned space.

Currently, most TV stations broadcast digitally, in preparation for this 2009 change to the digital-only format. How will this affect you?

Every TV set over 20 inches, sold as of March 2006, has been required to include a digital tuner. If you are a subscriber to digital cable, or satellite service, you are already receiving digital and need do nothing. Those affected must receive their TV exclusively through air broadcasts, via an antenna. Their options are to purchase a new TV, with a digital tuner, or to purchase a digital converter box, around \$70. The FCC has allocated funds to offer consumers two coupons, worth \$40 each, to offset the cost of those new digital boxes.

In Memory of Prof. William (Bill) H. Dennen



April 8, 1920 - January 20, 2008

A celebration of the life of former Nahant resident, William (Bill) Dennen, who passed away on January 20, 2008, will be held on April 12th, at 11:00 a.m., at the Trinity Congregational Church, in Gloucester.

Born in Gloucester, he was an Eagle Scout at the young age of 14 and served his country in the U.S. Marine Corps, a veteran of World War II. He continued to serve in the reserves until 1964, when he retired as a Lt. Colonel.

Prof. Dennen received his B.S. degree in Geology from M.I.T. in 1942 and PhD from M.I.T. in 1949. He first worked as an instructor in 1949 at M.I.T. and continued as an assistant professor from 1952 to 1957 and as an associate professor from 1957 to 1967.

He then went to the University of Kentucky, where he was a professor from 1967 to 1972. He served as chairman of the Geology Dept. from 1967 to 1972 and was the acting Dean of the graduate school from 1970 to 1972.

He was also the director of Cabot Spectrographic Lab, in the mid-1950s and from 1972 to 1983. He was involved in consulting and exploration in Pennsylvania, Nevada, Yukon Territory, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Colorado, Maine, Spain, Venezuela, Ecuador, Brazil, Australia, Liberia, Guinea and Ghana.

He is survived by his wife, Shirley E. Anderson, sons, William S. Dennen and Peter D. Dennen; daughter, The Reverend Susan Dennen de Rodriguez, as well as several granchildren. He will be interred in the Beechbrook Cemetary in Gloucester.

His daughter, The Reverend Susan Dennen de Rodriguez, who moved away many years ago, still has many friends in Nahant and visits occasionally.

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Agenda for Safer Waters by Polly Bradley

Rain barrels and compost bins, a summer SWIM for SWIM, the Mass Ocean Bill, and the potential effect of climate change on Nahant, will be on the agenda for SWIM's April meeting. Safer Waters in Massachusetts (Nahant SWIM, Inc.) will meet on Monday, April 7th, at 7:00 p.m., at Northeastern University Marine Science Center, 430 Nahant Road.

At SWIM's March meeting, members approved, unanimously, a letter to the Massachusetts House-Senate Conference Committee on Ocean Management. This committee is charged with bringing together the two different versions of the Massachusetts Ocean Bill, passed by the Senate (S. 2346) last fall and by the House (H4527) in February.

Excerpts from the SWIM letter are below:

Safer Waters in Massachusetts (SWIM) is writing to urge you to take the strongest possible stance for protection of the ocean environment, while you are working to reconcile the Senate and House versions of the Massachusetts Ocean Management Bill. Your major consideration should be to protect the ecology and the fisheries and build them back up to maximum sustainable levels. The living resources of the coastal zone cannot be duplicated, or located anywhere else, whereas construction of most of the facilities you allow, can be done on land.

Safer Waters in Massachusetts is a local, volunteer group, that since 1984 has worked to protect the ocean around Nahant and beyond. SWIM particularly endorses the environmental aspect of the Massachusetts Ocean Act, but we have several concerns.

First, the Senate version of the bill seems much more protective of natural resources, than the House bill. SWIM urges you to take the Senate version, as the template from which you work. You need to require that an Ocean Management Plan be in place, within two years and require that development be consistent with the plan.

The burden of proof should be up to the proponents of a project, to show that the project will not harm the fisheries. It seems as if all the emphasis and detail in the Act are on the side of development — energy (alternative and otherwise), food production (wild and aquaculture), recreation, transportation, LNG terminals, telecommunications cables, etc., while environmental protection gets mentioned, almost as an afterthought.

Modern technology has made it feasible to build, regardless of storms and tides, in locations where it was formerly impossible. (The Australians are beginning to mine for metals in the deep ocean trenches.) That does not mean that every project that can be done, should be done. You do not want the Massachusetts Coastal Zone to become the greatest land-grab since the Oklahoma Run.

What will keep the wealthy and powerful from using this bill, and the changes in

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Chapter 91, and the loss of the protection of the Ocean Sanctuaries Act, to rush projects through, without regard to the fisheries, the ecology of the ocean, the endangered whales and sea turtles, and water-dependent uses of the waterfront? There's little detail in the bill on how the ocean will be protected, but plenty of detail on how the ocean will be exploited.

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Development and protection should be in bal ance, but instead, "capitalization" is as heavy as a giant on the down side of the seesaw, while ocean protection is left high and dry, up in the air. SWIM is in favor of wind energy and other alternative forms of energy in the right places, but the bill now seems to leave the door open for just about anything, alternative or otherwise.

Please write into the bill environment first, development second. SWIM has real concerns about whether, under the proposed Mass Ocean Act, it will become easier than ever, for corporations to get proposals through, whether or not the environment suffers.

Nice plan, wrong direction by Pat O'Reilly

5 million dollars. That is an estimate of market value for the 12 houses that the Town would have torn down and the land sold, for no less than 2.1 million dollars, according to the RFP that will be before Town Meeting. So, what is it that the Town hopes to get in return for giving up potentially 3 million dollars in market value? And why should Town Meeting approve this RFP?

The RFP before Town Meeting would seek a developer, to replace the 12 houses on Castle and Gardner Roads and Goddard Drive, with 28 housing units, an increase in housing density of 16 units. 7 units would be subsidized, affordable housing and the other 21 units would be market-rate housing. Castle Road would get new single-family houses which might be nicer-looking than the existing houses, while about 20 units would be built on Goddard Drive.

Conservatively, the market-rate housing units (the 21 apartments and houses) will be worth 7 or 8 million dollars and subsidies will mean that a developer won't be losing money on those 7 units of affordable housing. Additionally, the point-rating system for the RFP ensures that the largest developers will be rated most highly. This project would be a very good deal for the winning developer, with potentially very little, or no, financial return for the Town's investment, 3 years ago.

If my memory serves, one of the reasons given to buy the houses in the first place, was that we wouldn't want a big developer buying up all these houses and putting in a Chapter 40B development, against the wishes of the Town. Yet the proposal before us now, is exactly that type of development. Worse, it wouldn't move us appreciably closer to any affordable housing goals the State has for our town. Which still leaves many neighborhoods very vulnerable to the whims of a large 40B developer, like the ones we are now inviting into the town to bid on this project.

Is this the best we can do? I say no. We have to go back and explore more than just this one alternative and have a real debate about Town priorities. There is no rush. The market-rate rents on those homes will easily pay for the loan taken out to buy them. Those houses, originally built at taxpayers expense, have plenty of usable life left in them, with proper maintenance. So, waiting until rents have paid down the loan is an appealing option and gives us time to revisit our priorities at some future time. Once the loan is paid off, or paid down, then the Town could be in a position to set aside more of that land as park land and still be able to create more affordable housing. Or we could decide to use the additional money from a market-rate sale in the nearer term, to buy up some of the vacant housing in town and use it for affordable housing without increasing housing density.

No plan is ever going to get 100% support of the town's residents, but we can do a lot better, than to make an already dense area of town, even more dense and to give up on the opportunities for more parkland and more affordable housing, that this purchase was supposed to provide.

The first principle of "Smart Growth" is to first, make the most use of the housing and infrastructure that we have. That is what will save the Town money and make it more affordable and more enjoyable for people to live here, now and in the future.

Last October, two of my students Bruce Barrowclough, Paul Marios and I, went to see Les Paul at the Iridium Jazz Club, in Manhattan, NYC. Paul Marios had suggested that I bring my guitar and sit in with Les, which I was more than a little skeptical about.

Upon arrival at the club, I inquired who I should talk to about sitting in. One person sent me to the rhythm guitarist, whose reaction was not unlike he had seen a ghost. (My

hair is long and I had a Jeff Beck T-shirt on, as well as I was wearing a panama hat.) He sent me over to Rusty, Les Paul's son. Rusty was cool. He asked me some questions about how long I had been playing and what I was doing now. I told him I have been playing for 32 years and have been teaching for 26 years. Then he introduced me to Les, who



had much the same reaction as his rhythm guitarist. He asked me what key would we be playing in A, D or G, as if I was a first grader. I said, "Les, any key that you want. It doesn't matter. I will not embarrass you. You may embarrass me, but I won't embarrass you." He looked satisfied and I said, "Okay, Joe. I'll call you up during the set."

So there I sat, listening to the legendary Les Paul and his crack band playing jazz, sweating bullets and wondering what I was doing there. I felt that I was out of my league and that it was going to be a disaster.

Well, he called me up, telling the audience, "This guy said he wasn't going to embarrass me, so where is he?"

Boy, was I nervous. I plugged in and the first thing he asked was, "So, Joe, what happened to your barber."

The audience laughed and I told him that I didn't get along with my barber. Les asked what I wanted to play, so I said, "How about "Stormy Monday."

He said "Great. I like that one."

To my relief the song went over well and Les asked me to pick-up the tempo. So I said, "Les, I have a song you're going to love. It's called, "I Used to Have a Brain, Then I Got Married." Les laughed and said, "I wrote a song similar to that. It's called, "I Wanted to Tell You I Love You But You Were Sitting on My Face!"

The crowd went nuts. The song (Brain) went over well and we had a great, memorable night. Les signed my Les Paul guitar later that night, writing, "To Joe Keep Rockin' Les Paul."

Thanks, Les.

PS. There is a great documentary of Les called, Les Paul "Chasing Sound," that I wholeheartedly recommend. This man and his contributions to music and recording are amazing, as well as is his guitar playing, which was incredible.
