Strengthening the Community for 15 Years!

This issue of the Nahant Harbor Review marks the 15th Anniversary of "the little paper" so dear to Nahanters, both here and abroad. The by-line below the front page heading says it all: "A monthly publication, in service since March 1994, dedicated to strengthening the spirit of community by serving the interests of civic, religious and business organizations of Nahant, Massachusetts, USA."

Just a little over 15 years ago, Donna Hanlon, Editor and Owner, decided to take the Seaside Business Services Grand Opening flyer mailing to the next level. She organized a 3-page newsletter containing a Community Calendar, a few ads and a few informative articles, which were contributed by advertisers and friends. Soon, the Harbor Review, as it was originally called, began showing up monthly, in mailboxes, across Nahant. I moved to Little Nahant in April of the same year, 1994. For me, I have not known a month to go by, when the "little paper" wouldn't be delivered to my home

Since its conception, the paper has provided much needed information to town residents. The world-wide web didn't dominate our lives, as it does today and other local publications just weren't covering the majority of Nahant activities, with any detail. The Nahant Harbor Review provided a vehicle for local business men and women to advertise their services and for the Nahant groups and organizations to get information out to the community. Nahant's business owners supported the newspaper through their advertising support, which allowed the paper to grow.

Since 1994, the monthly paper has grown from its 3-page beginning to a 24-page tabloid and it continues to grow. Color pages, the monthly historical centerfold "Summer In Nahant", crossword puzzles and "Where's Hoompa" snap shots, are just a few of the changes seen within the past decade.

Ray Barron's birthday greetings, "Useless Information" and Sally Slagle's monthly column on dance and fitness, as well as her Dance Dimensions and the Wilson Brothers Construction ad every month, are part of the paper's original foundation. And, Harriet Steeves, whose attention to detail and kind heart, has been the paper's proofreader since the very beginning. They join with Donna and Ron in celebrating 15 years of continuous participation.

Although the monthly publication is a labor of love, there are times, usually around midnight on the night before the paper goes to print, where the pressure to get all submitted articles and ads looking just right, can be seen on the faces of those responsible for getting the paper to residents on time.

About once a year, Donna will look at me, and her husband Ron, co-owner of Hanlon publications, "sigh" and with a tired look, say "Why do I continue to do this!" I remind her of the story she once told me, long ago, of her standing at Captain Seaside during breakfast, just a little over 15 years ago, face to face with a local resident who claimed she had no right to start a newspaper in this town!

Donna Hanlon isn't one to be told what she can and can not do. So to that Captain Seaside patron who challenged the right for what is now called the Nahant Harbor Review to exist, I "Thank You"! Whether it will influence Donna and Ron Hanlon, along with a fabulous and dedicated staff and volunteers to keep the "Little Paper" going for another 15 years, is yet to be seen. But for today, may we all join in by thanking Donna and Ron Hanlon for their continued dedication and passion in strengthening the spirit that exists in the beautiful Town of Nahant.

Bailey's Hill Developers Invite Nahanters to a Special Meeting

Nahant's most exciting new real estate development gets underway.



Local developers, Phil Singleton and Jeffrey Gouchberg, are inviting the public to meetings in March and April, to begin the local sales and marketing process for The Residences at Bailey's Hill, a 28-unit, mixed-style, luxury residential development, planned for the former military housing site on Castle Road.

The March 25 and April 8th open houses will be held at the Town Hall and will include a brief presentation of the development. Potential buyers, as well as interested parties, are invited to attend. Attendees will be given an opportunity to take advantage of pre-construction sale prices, for buyers interested in purchasing a unit.

As many Town residents are aware, this development is the culmination of four (4) years of planning and community participation by the Town, starting with its purchase of the military housing development on Castle and Gardner Roads and Goddard Drive and culminating in the selection of the team of Gouchberg and Singleton.

This local marketing effort marks the beginning of the development process for the team who, last November, were designated by the local selection committee, the Board of Selectmen and by an overwhelmingly supportive Town Meeting vote.

Singleton and Gouchberg have significant development experience and are genuinely excited about the opportunity to develop a residential community, in the Bailey's Hill neighborhood of Nahant. (Continued on page 12.)

To find out what comments have been sent in to the Environmental Protection Agency about the proposed Lower North Shore No Discharge Area, you can access the federal docket at http://www.regulations.gov and type in EPA-R01-OW-2008-0921. The comments had not yet been posted as of February 4, 2009, but they should be available shortly. Ann Rodney of the Ocean and Coastal Protection Unit, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), New England Region, said that the EPA has received over 65 comments, all except one in favor of the No Discharge Area. Many thanks to all who wrote to the EPA urging them to designate the waters of Nahant, Lynn, Swampscott, Saugus and Revere, as a No Discharge Area.

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

Have Your Picture Taken With The Maxim Gun

A venerable, nearly-forgotten souvenir of World War I, will soon leave Nahant forever. A Maxim gun, originally captured and retrieved by the seventeen survivors of Sergeant Alvin York's platoon, is about to embark on what may be its final journey, to the Museum of Appalachia, Norris, TN.

Surrendered among other weapons in 1918, with 132 German prisoners, the Maxim gun was sent to Nahant, by Mayland Lewis, an Army clerk, serving in France, who took the first shorthand report of the battle from Sergeant York.

Later, the Maxim gun was exhibited as a trophy of war, in the Town's 1919 "Welcome Home" Parade, when it was pulled by the Boy Scouts in a red wagon. After the parade, Lewis presented the Maxim gun to the Nahant Public Library. Lewis was later appointed a judge.


The library's attic was the gun's home, until it was rediscovered in 2003. Once its provenance was determined, the Library Trustees looked into selling the weapon at auction, but found that the gun had never been registererd.

Because the Maxim gun is classed as an unregistered automatic weapon, the Library is allowed neither to sell it, nor keep it; the gun can only be transferred to a museum that receives federal funding.

The Library Trustees have made an agreement with the Museum of Appalachia, and that Museum is building an exhibit around the weapon.

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Northeastern University Marine Science Center Evening Lecture Series

On Tuesday, March 24th, at 7:00 p.m., Dr. Luke Miller, Marine Science Center Researcher, Northeastern University, will present, "Some like it hot, some like it cold: Temperature and Life in the Ocean."

In the depths of our northeastern winter, it seems appropriate to examine the role of temperature in the ocean environment and its effects on marine organisms. We will discuss examples of uniquely cold-adapted animals, from Antarctica, that manage to flourish in waters that always sit on the verge of freezing. Then, looking forward to the coming warm weather of spring time, we will move to warmer climes, to see how animals cope with the wildly fluctuating temperatures, that characterize our local shores

On April 14th, Jonathan Bird, Underwater Cinematographer, will present, "Creatures of the Deep Blue."

Creatures of the Deep Blue is Jonathan Bird's new hard-cover coffee-table photography book, about large marine animals—whales, dolphins, sharks, rays, turtles, seals and manatees. This beautiful full-color book is his most spectacular book to-date and contains some of his most magical images from around the world.

To say that I'm running for Library Trustee because I want to make sure everyone can feel that way, is simplistic, yet it is the best I can do—you will have to trust me on the rest.

Report of the Nahant Library Trustees

When our library was built, in 1895, it had 3 Trustees, as it does today. The Chairman, Henry Cabot Lodge, took charge of the plans and construction of the building. Today's Trustees are John Dineen, John Welsh and George Richardson.

In 1990, Daniel DeStefano became our librarian. He attends meetings of the Trustees, where needs for expenditure, including building maintenance, as well as books, are addressed.

Whereas the library of 1895 had 9290 books, today's library owns about 68,000. Unused books are regularly sold and removed, while new ones, fictional and factual, can always be seen topping a shelf that extends along one wall of the library.

The wonderful Friends of the Library accept tax-deductible donations, that are enormously helpful in meeting our needs. Thanks to them and the Trustees, the library now has Wi-Fi, enabling people to bring their own laptop computers in and use them. If a few people in Town donated laptops they no longer use to the Friends, they could be made available in the library to the public.

A recent remarkable breakthrough has been achieved by Trustee John Welsh, who arranged the sale of the library's machine gun, allegedly used in World War One by Sergeant York, and a feature of Town parades in former years. More recently, the Trustees had it removed from the library and sequestered in the Police Station. It now has been purchased by the Museum of Appalachia for \$10,000 and the money has been placed in our Building Fund.


Currently, the Trustees are thinking in terms of growth. Our L-shaped building has an empty space behind it that can be filled with new building, steel and glass perhaps, that would contain an elevator and make our spacious top floors accessible and useful.

It has been a great privilege to serve as a Trustee of the Library during these years of progress, and I hope to continue to do so after the coming election.

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
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Snacking By Sallee Slagle, Director, Dance Dimensions

We were often taught that you shouldn't eat between meals. Well, research is telling us now that those long hours between meals, may be making it more difficult for us to lose weight. Metabolism will slow down if we don't eat often enough. If your body is with out food for 4-hours, it begins to suppress calorie burning to conserve energy, until the next meal. So it now seems that snacking can help us lose weight, IF we do it wisely. We want to keep our metabolism high, so we are burning more calories all the time. Remember, as we age, our metabolism naturally slows down at a rate of about 5-10% every 10 years, which could mean a gain of 5 pounds each decade, if we are not mindful.

Okay, so you should add healthy snacks to fill in the long gaps between meals. Snacking can also help keep your blood sugar levels from dipping too low. When these levels drop, we feel tired, distracted and crave foods that are often unhealthy. Even if you are dieting, you should plan snacks as part of your daily food plan. Keep the cravings from luring you off your diet and keep the calorie burning high, all through the day. Everytime you eat, your metabolism will increase, as it takes energy (burns calories) to digest food.

Let's look at healthy snack choices. Donut vs. apple. Muffin vs. yogurt. These choices may seem obvious, but even "healthy" snacks are deceiving. Power bars are often more like a glorified and well-marketed candy bar. Avoid refined sugar and flourtype snacks, as they are empty calories. Look for whole grain, or better still, snacks are a perfect way to increase your daily fruit and vegetable servings. A piece of fruit may be sweet, but it is also a source of vitamins, anti-oxidants, minerals and healthy fiber.

If you find fruits just don't handle the hunger pangs, add a small amount of protein, like a handful of almonds, peanut butter on apple slices, carrot sticks with humous, or celery filled with low-fat cream cheese. Try yogurt sprinkled with a handful of granolla. Check labels. There are many "healthy" snacks available, but read the labels and watch for added sugars, corn syrup, fructose, etc. Better to add your own sweetness with fruit, or even a little honey, which has many healthy benefits.

Sugary drinks are added calories without added nutrition. Diet drinks have questionable chemical substitutes. Water, plain or sparkling, are still your best choice. Avoid the sweetened coffee drinks, too! The calories are often higher than you think. Caffeine and sugar are both addictive and leave you craving more. So some sugar often leads to MORE sugar. Watch out for that and keep the sugars you ingest, more natural.

Keep snack calories beetween 100-200 calories and only 2-3x a day, ie. midmorning, mid afternoon and evening. If you are active, the extra 400-600 calories is easily burned. If you are sedentary, keep snack calories lower, say 300-400 daily. Prepare, or keep in stock, your health choices to avoid slipping up with unhealthy choices, when healthy alternatives are not available. Watch out for mindless grazing. Don't leave the larger bag open and in reach. Take out only the amount you intend to eat and put the rest away! There are several 100 calorie packages sold now that may help.

If snacking between meals is so important to keeping your metabolism running high, then definitely do not skip meals. If you want to lose weight, you do have to lower your calorie intake. When you add snacks, you may need to have smaller portions, or lower the total calories in your meals, to make the equation work.

The most important meal of the day is breakfast. It is proven that those who eat breakfast have a higher than average metabolism, compared with those who don't. So don't skip any meals and use healthy snacks to keep the fuel burning all day long. Remember, when food seems scarce, the body conserves and burns those calories much slower. Don't starve. Use healthy snacks throughout the day to beat unhealthy cravings. Keep the calories burning!

Massage: Sooner is Better Than Later By Susan Cadigan LMT, NCTMB, Nahant Therapeutic Massage

Spring is here and many New Year resolutions are being challenged daily. Typically, our efforts result in too much, too soon. Overload and ignoring pain and tension can result in injury, or impede performance, as well as create muscle imbalance. Muscle imbalance can occur by way of a constant build-up of tension in the muscles. This, in turn, can lead to stress, impingement, or dysfunction in joints, ligaments, tendons, as well as the muscles involved. Often, the imbalance is ignored, or tolerated until injury, or the chronic pain can no longer be tolerated. Recently, I fell over backward, heels over head, off a Swiss ball. Yes, I was fooling around and did not use my hands, or feet, to stabilize the ball. I was entertaining myself and performing a balancing act. There was much laughter involved and no thought of injury. The next day, I was quite stiff and felt like my shoulder blade was bruised. The simple trauma of jamming my shoulder and back on the floor, while "playing," actually resulted in my neck and arms not being able to move freely and without effort and feeling some nagging pain. This was the result of my shoulder area being pushed beyond its capacity and the tissue becoming immobile and inflexible, in response to the jolt it received. The fascia network was damaged.

Gradually the stiffness became like a weight on my shoulders and other pains started to set in. I knew to take care of this situation sooner than later, before the issue became more concrete and could take much longer to remedy. This is where a skilled massage therapist came into play.

I drive over one hour, one way, to see a massage/muscular therapist that has the skills that work for me. The myofascial mobilization approach in massage is considered a state-of-the-art technique. Job Searching in 2009

Give your résumé a shot of Botox!

Your résumé is a marketing tool that paints a picture of your value and

answers the employer's question, "WIFM?" or "What's in it for me?" Résumé styles have changed dramatically in the past few years and, if you're new to the job market, yours may need a "facelift."

Get up to speed on "résumé speak." Use bullets that start with action verbs; sentence fragments are fine. Proofread; spell check DOES NOT catch all errors. Eliminate "I" and "responsible for." Do not "age" yourself—go back only 10–15 years on your employment history. Leave enough "white space." Studies have shown that an organized, easy-to-read résumé gives you an edge over a slightly more qualified applicant, with a visually unappealing, disorganized résumé. Use a professional email address and outgoing message on your phone; HR doesn't want to listen to 30 seconds of your favorite music.

Avoid: Hobbies (UNLESS relevant), religious affiliations, birth date, pictures. A "Font Circus"; odd fonts, or too many fonts, are distracting and may not work on HR printers.

Rather than a laundry list of tasks you've performed on the job, you should accentuate your ACCOMPLISH-MENTS—actions you took that improved a situation, solved a problem, or increased the bottom line. Organize your thoughts into PAR (problem>action>result) or OAR (opportunity>action>result) statements and don't be vague.

Did you solve a problem, or handle a crisis situation? Create, or build something? Receive an "attaboy"? Recommend, develop, and implement a new idea, system, or procedure, or improve an existing system, or procedure? Increase sales or profit? Be specific. Use numbers, examples, and percentages.

For example, instead of "Sold clothing and arranged displays in infants/toddlers clothing department," you might say, "Used outstanding listening and communicating skills, to recommend items for purchase, consistently exceeding weekly sales goals by 10–15%."

Rather than "Took orders and served customers," you might state "Learned 100+ menu items to consistently provide excellent customer service in high-volume restaurant."

Employers are hiring. It might take more time and effort on your part, but your next opportunity is out there. You just need to give yourself every advantage you have at your disposal. So give that résumé a shot of Botox.

The following figures represent the challenge given the FY2010 allocated funding for the school department:

Fiscal Year Total School Budget Swampscott Tuition Johnson School Budget 2008 \$2,977,754 \$1,285,120 \$1,692,634 2009 \$2,913,272 \$1,280,480 \$1,632,792 2010 \$2,883,644 \$1,219,648 \$1,663,996

Keep in mind, this funding, while level at best, represents more than \$210,000 above net school spending for FY2010, or double the expected \$104,000 above net school spending. School funding is also reduced by Charter School tuition charges of \$80,864. It is understood the Town is level-funding all departments, so this is not in any manner critical of the school's slice of the Town's funding. Instead, the school has considered various avenues to meet the allocated sum, while maintaining some of the recent initiatives, which have assisted the Johnson School in its' educational improvement efforts, reflected by this year's encouraging MCAS results. Increased arts & music programs and a newly-established library media center, are just two examples that have been achieved, through partnership with the PTO, the Nahant Education Foundation, Town support and a willingness from parents and Townspeople to volunteer their services. It is my expectation we will meet our budgetary target with such programs intact.

Capital improvements to school grounds will be pursued through working with the Town and other means, but not through passage of an override article.

The superintendent search continues, with a committee named, a timetable set and several applications already received. Through every step of the budget process, it is clear to me the new superintendent will have big shoes to fill for Dr. Lisi.

On a personal note, my term is coming to a close and I will not pursue re-election. I encourage anyone interested in running for the school committee to call me, if you would like to discuss what is involved with serving in this role. Please note, papers must be filed with the Town Clerk by 5:00 p.m., on March 9, 2009, for a candidate's name to be included on the ballot.

(continued from page 1) Singleton commented, "The Residences at Bailey's Hill are going to be an exclusive and singular development for Nahant. We will offer residents an exceptional living opportunity, with significant open space, dramatic views of the Atlantic Ocean and sweeping views of the local golf course. Our twenty (20) unit condominium building, will offer luxury units, with underground parking and luxurious finishes. Our single-family homes will provide new housing opportunities for families, in Nahant and the area."

The development includes twenty (20) condominiums in one building and eight (8) single-family homes. In addition, the Town has required that two of the single family homes and five of the condominium units, be made available as affordable units with a local preference for a number of the affordable units.

Jeff Gouchberg, when asked about the timing of this development given current market conditions offered, "We feel strongly that Nahant and its residents represent a unique market as there are no options on the island for residents looking for the type of living space being created at Bailey's Hill. Our development plans have created significant interest from the community and we're hoping that translates to buyers."

Two dates, March 25 and April 8, at 7:00 p.m., at the Town Hall, have been set aside for the developer's Open Houses. Refreshments will be served.

Interested buyers and the general public are invited to come together on these two dates to review the condominium and house plans, pricing, amenities, the lottery process for the affordable sales and the sale reservation process.

The developers have also engaged the services of local Nahant broker, Judi Moccia of Coldwell Banker, to lead the sales effort at Bailey's Hill. Interested buyers should call Judi at 781-799-7777.

In August of 2008, our small town of Nahant lost a very courageous woman – Terry Ward (Trentsch). After a very long and hard fought battle, we lost our dear friend Terry to cancer. When thinking of Terry, one would remember her sweet smile and contagious laugh. Terry was a very gentle soul and loved by so many.

As some of you know, growing up in this town, you would go to school with the same classmates from Kindergarten through 9th Grade. Terry and her friends were the graduating class of 1977 from the Nahant Jr. High school. As Nahant does not have a high school, when you graduated from the 9th Grade, you would have to choose which high school you wanted to attend in Lynn. Terry chose Lynn English High School along with several others;



many chose Lynn Classical High School, including myself, while the rest went to St. Mary's High School. Even though we were no longer in the same school, we remained friends and always "stayed in touch." We were just a small town group of classmates with a unique bond – Nahant Jr. High School.

Nahant in the 70's was pretty cool. Not much to do, but we always found a way to have a great time, especially in the summer. Our thing was we'd call each other early in the day and say "OK meet ya 1/2 way." Terry would always be the first one there sitting on the mailbox waiting for the gang at Mitchell's Corner. We'd talk, try to think of what to do, and always decided to go to Sandy Beach. So our summer days would begin by swimming, laughing and some of us getting terribly sunburned. At lunchtime, we would go across the street and order subs and fries from Frank and Sam's. Then back to the beach and more swimming and laughing while we talked about what we were going to do that night. Our nights were pretty much the same – we would meet 1/2 way at Mitchell's Corner, talked about what to do, and usually decided to head down to the Courts and hang out with the boys and play a little "hoop." There we laughed and flirted and had so much fun until the lights went out at 10 p.m., and the next day would start out and end pretty much the same way.

Come late August, we jumped on the bus and headed to Central Square Lynn to shop for our school clothes on Union Street. What stores they had back then! Lerners, Hoffman's, T.W. Rogers, and Thom McCann's, but Lerner's was "thee" store to shop at. We would also go to Woolworth's and Kresgees. I can't remember which one had the picture booth, but we would get as many of us in as we could, and we would let the snap shots begin! When we were done, we would kill ourselves laughing looking at the silly pictures while walking back to get the bus. We just always had so much fun in those days. Now, fast forward to the 80's and the 90's. We have graduated from our different high schools and gone on to do our own thing. Some of us went on to college, some of us got full-time jobs, some of us even got married and had children or possibly remarried and more children (blah blah). You get the drift, but, whatever path we may have taken, we "stayed in touch."

I really can't remember what year I started what we all came to call the "Annual Girls' Christmas Party." It was always on the 2nd Friday in December, and everyone knew not to make plans for that night. We always did a Yankee swap, which made us laugh until it hurt. The first few years were fun, but not as memorable as the coming years. As the years went on, the party got bigger and bigger; friends bringing new friends; and it got louder and louder. At times, there could be 40 gals in my small apartment, and it was so incredibly fun and insane. During the summer, we would be at the beach, and we would already be talking about the party and trying to decide what the price should be for the swap. These parties have been going on for over 20 years, and when Terry arrived and found me amongst the girls, she would give me my Christmas hug, and hand me a small little gift. It was always an ornament – an angel ornament.

This past July, 2008, Jill invited our old group of friends over to her house for some cheese and crackers and a little "happy hour." We were to bring photos and memorabilia "stuff." I, of course, was the only one that could find my "stuff," but I brought enough for everyone to see – the 9th Grade Year Book, 9th Grade prom pictures at the Nahant Country Club with all of us girls in our white gowns and the boys looking so handsome in their white tuxes. I also had pictures of Terry and me as hockey cheerleaders cheering for the Nahant Islanders. There were more pictures of the beach, the middle school birth-days, and, of course, the "booth pictures." No one could believe I still had all this stuff, but someone has to keep it! Once again we were all laughing, it got very loud, and you would look over at Terry and there she sat with that amazing smile of hers, and we could hear her quietly giggling. She was really enjoying herself, but how could you not with Jobie doing her "shtick" being the MC. To see Terry smile and laugh was what it was all about that night.

Sadly, a week later Terry lost her battle to that horrible disease. We knew our friend was no longer in pain, but that day "our pain" began.

My girl Terry never failed to call me on my birthday. That day would come and the phone would ring and there was Terry saying "happy birthday" to me. Even in the last few years knowing she was not feeling as well as she had before, the phone would ring and there she was with my birthday greeting. But, in September of 2008, my phone didn't ring and that broke my heart. A fierce deep sadness came over me as I realized that my life-long friend Terry was gone and she would never be able to wish me another happy birthday.

This past Christmas (2008), I counted my "Terry Christmas Angels", and I have 14 of them. I feel so incredibly lucky. There is one thing that cancer will never take from us and that is our memory of Terry, especially that night at Jill's when we were all together. Another memory was created that night – a beautiful photo of all of us sitting on Jill's couch gathered around Terry. I know we all will cherish that picture and that night forever.

We would like to plant a tree in memory of Terry along with a bench and a plaque as a dedication to her. A site has not been picked as of yet for our memorial, but I will keep you posted. I have opened up an account under the name "Terry's Tree"/ Janet (Pereira) LeBlanc. We would like to make a special spot in town, this town that Terry called "home", where friends and family can go and think of their special thoughts and memories of her.

Oh, and those 14 angels I told you about, I know I have 15 now and she is watching over us with that one of a kind smile.


In Memory of Jean Ann (Fairbrother) Lebro formerly of Nahant

U. S. Coast Guard Rescue 21 Project

Your chances of rescue, should you have an emergency, while at sea, will greatly improve in May of 2009, when The United States Coast Guard activates its Rescue 21 System in this area. Mariners currently use Channel 16 on their VHF radio; to broadcast a Mayday, when their lives, or property, are in imminent peril. Other boaters, using Channel 16, to hail their friends, may drown out this broadcast. Rescue 21 will solve that problem.

What is required is a VHF radio, with Digital Select Calling (DSC), that is connected to a Global Positioning System (GPS). The GPS must be compatible with the radio. The owner must register with the FCC and be assigned a Maritime Mobile Service Identity (MMSI) number. (See below where you can go to register.) The DSC radios are equipped with an emergency button, which, when pushed, and the radio is connected to a GPS, will broadcast a Mayday on Channel 70, giving the Coast Guard and other boaters your Latitude and Longitude. The Coast Guard will also have a description of your vessel.

Channel 70 is reserved for this express purpose and is monitored by all commercial vessels over a certain length. Other vessels, including pleasure craft, with DSC radios, will be notified on Channel 70 of your Mayday.

If you have a choice, purchase a DSC Class D radio, which meets the international IEC 62238 standards. This radio constantly monitors Channel 70 and allows you to monitor and use another channel for communications. A DSC radio that is not Class D, only allows use, or monitoring of one channel at a time.

Even if you do not have a new radio that is linked to a GPS, Rescue 21's new triangulation towers will have a better chance of locating your position, when you broadcast a Mayday.

Backward to their ancestors! Homecoming: An bealach' na bhaile! Beyond conflict being The post-peace message.













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

30 Years In Business

When the "check engine" light comes on in your car, don't think it will go away anytime soon. There's usually a good reason for the light to come on, and the longer you ignore it, the greater the likelihood that one problem will lead to another. "If there's one thing I ask car owners to do, it's to pay attention to that light on the instrument panel," said Frank Barile, owner of Enzo's garage in Nahant, whose specialty is vehicle electronics.

"I can't tell you how many cars I've worked on that might have taken a few hours to fix, but because their owners didn't pay attention to the 'check engine' light, the damage is more widespread. Sometimes a car's computer might only need to be reprogrammed."

Frank is a firm believer in winterizing your car for optimum performance during colder months. And now that winter is only six weeks away, every car owner should think about winterizing. Even though today's cars last a long time - 150,000-200,000 miles on the odometer is common - they still require regular maintenance, including oil changes every 3,000 miles.

"Most models, even those that are on the lower end, will last, if they are taken care of properly," said Frank.

Enzo's owner said that checking the anti-freeze and fluid levels are crucial to smooth running engines. Tire pressure, windshield wipers and washer, belts and hoses all need to be checked, too.

Frank has been in business for 29 years, so he's had plenty of time to know cars inside and out. His two man shop performs electronic diagnostic checks on everything from Jaguars to Chevrolet's. Enzo's garage is opened from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

"We get cars in and out of our garage quickly," said Frank. "The best advice I can give anyone is to winterize their cars now, to keep the computer running smoothly."

People from Nahant and all over the North Shore come to Frank when it comes time to service their cars, no matter what the season.

"Word of mouth advertising goes a long way," he said. "People come back because I take care of them. They know at Enzo's they're guaranteed honest, hard work."







First-graders and Jellyfish at the Marine Science Center By Tracy Hajduk and Dr. Kazuo Mori

On Friday, February 6th, Ms. Brown and Mrs. Peeverb's first-graders anxiously arrived at the Marine Science Center to meet a jelly expert, Dr. Kazuo Mori. Dr. Mori, whose son is in first-grade at the Johnson School, worked with the students to give them first-hand experience with these amazing creatures that have no brains, bones, or hearts. The students saw jellies in various stages of their complex life cycle and made comparisons between three species of jellies. Finally, students observed jelly behaviors, from the swimming ephyrae and medusae, to watching attached polyps feeding. They discussed these themes and learned how such primitive creatures have survived, for over 1,000,000,000 years on the earth.

Dr. Mori is a postdoctoral fellow, originally from Japan, who now resides in Nahant with his family. Dr. Mori is a neuroethologist and conducts research to understand how jelly-fishes integrate sensory inputs, without a centralized nervous system.

Seasoned and Smart Now on Nahant Access TV

"Seasoned and Smart," the monthly cable television show produced by Greater Lynn Senior Services (GLSS), is now airing on Nahant Community Access TV, seen on Comcast Channel 8 and Verizon Channel 45.

"Every month, we tackle a new topic," says co-producer Moeun Him. "We focus on issues related to seniors, and we cover a wide variety of topics that we think would be of interest to them and their families." For instance, the show has featured everything from recycling to domestic abuse and topics as diverse as fall and fire prevention. In March, the show will feature the Group Adult Foster Care program, which provides daily personal care and homemaking assistance, to people with disabilities, who are age 22 or older. The Medicaid-sponsored program allows people with disabilities to remain living in the community, rather than being placed in a nursing home. GLSS' Marge DiVirgilio will host the program, with guests Lee Webster, who oversees the Group Adult Foster Care program at GLSS, as well as on-site, personal interviews with consumers currently receiving services through the program.

GLSS is the Area Agency on Aging and Aging Services Access Point serving people over 60, adults of any age with disabilities, and their families in Lynn, Lynnfield, Nahant, Saugus, and Swampscott. Every year, GLSS provides a broad range of in-home assistance services to over 1,500 home care clients and more than 300,000 meals to seniors, many of whom are homebound. The Agency is also the MBTA's contractor for the North Territory of "The RIDE," providing more than 500,000 rides annually to disabled persons of all ages who live in 23 cities and towns north of Boston. 
