#### **Nahant Democrats to Hold Caucus**

Registered Democrats in Nahant will be holding their annual Caucus at Town Hall, February 3rd, at 2:00 p.m., to elect delegates and alternates to the 2007 Massachusetts Democratic Convention. Delegates will be equally divided between men and women, in accordance with Democratic Party rules. Any one, at least eighteen years old and registered as a Massachusetts Democrat, as of December 30, 2006, is welcome to attend the Caucus and run for a delegate position.

This year's Action Agenda Convention will be held on Saturday, May 19th at UMASS, Amherst. All Massachusetts Democrats chosen at their caucuses, will gather, to develop a new Action Agenda, outlining grassroots, party-building initiatives, to prepare us for the Presidential election in 2008. This year's Action Agenda will incorporate strategies that led to our overwhelming victory in the gubernatorial election, and provide recommendations for attracting more people to the Democratic Party.

Candidates for Delegate and Alternate must be present at the Caucus and consent to nomination in writing. Candidates may make a one-minute statement and may distribute materials on their behalf. All ballots will be written, secret and recorded by the caucus teller. Those people not elected as Delegate, or Alternate, may apply to be "add-on" Delegates in the following categories: youth (35 and under), minority and disabled.

Discrimination on the basis of race, sex, age, color, creed, national origin, religion, ethnic identity, sexual orientation, or economic status, in the conduct of the Caucus, is strictly prohibited. Challenges to the Delegate-selection process MUST be filed with the Massachusetts Democratic Party, 56 Roland Street, Suite 203, Boston, MA 02120, within ten days after the caucus.

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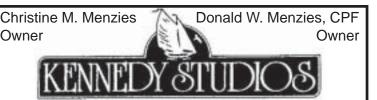
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### Cooking (and Eating) Class For Nahant Woman's Club

## Q & A by North Shore Physical Therapy

Q: I feel my steps are shorter and more hesitant than they used to be; sometimes, I feel unsteady on my feet. How can I improve my balance?

A: Balance depends on many different body systems; a problem with any one of them can make you feel unsafe on your feet, at times. Dizziness can cause a loss of balance. Dizziness can come from a medication interaction, low blood pressure, or can be a sign of a more serious illness. Let your doctor know if you are experiencing dizziness. S/he may want to schedule you for a vision exam, since a change in your vision can cause dizziness and may be easily corrected. Subtle changes in vision can change our depth perception, making it harder to maneuver on uneven surfaces.

Many treatable inner ear problems can cause vertigo. If you do experience vertigo (a spinning sensation, which can cause balance problems), talk with your doctor about treatment options. Specialized physical therapy can treat many types of vertigo.

Certain senses do tend to decline with age. Our reflexes tend to become slower, making recovery from a fall more difficult. As we age, strength and flexibility may decrease; this also interferes with your ability to move and react to uneven terrain. Footwear selection can affect balance and risk for falling. Wearing flatter, stable shoes with a closed heel, can help, and not walking barefoot at home will decrease the risk of falling. High heels, shoes with very soft, thick soles, or sandals, have been linked to falling.

The good news is that you can improve your balance with the right activities or training. First, clarify the source of the problem with your doctor. S/he can order physical therapy, if it's appropriate; physical therapy can help reverse strength or flexibility losses, and can show you how to improve your balance skills. The Council on Aging has strengthening classes to improve strength and stability. If you enjoy a class setting, ballet, or line-dancing, may be for you; if you enjoy the outdoors, try trail walking. T'ai chi has been shown to increase balance and decrease fall risk in older adults. If you are concerned about your joints or have arthritis, water aerobics is a great, safe way to get a cardiovascular workout, while exercising your core, an important player for better balance. Make sure you've cleared any activity with your doctor first. Each of these activities, when done safely, may improve your balance so you feel more confident.

Just to encourage you here are delightful reminiscences by Helen Baldwin Flynn:

"It all began in 1949 when our family relocated from Somerville, Massachusetts to this small sea coastal town. There were five of us: Chester, my Dad, Marietta, my Mom, two daughters; Helen aged 12, 6 year-old Mary and our newborn brother, Phillip. Whether fate or destiny, the Baldwin's, along with a few worldly possessions, took up residence in Bass Point. Our new address was 14 Colby Way. Our families, as well as generations before us, were city dwellers. The butcher, grocer, cobbler and movie theater were all within walking distance. My friends and I attended the Saturday matinees; Audie Murphy was my hero. The sounds of the city were constant with shrilling, whistling sounds of trains speeding along on the railroad track. The double doors of the big yellow buses opening wide, passengers ascending, or descending, the steep stairway. In contrast, everything in this small peninsula was still. Where one could clearly hear the chirping of the birds perched high on the limbs of the tall trees. The only other sounds were the waves splashing against the craggy rocks. We had only been in town less than a year, when Leo LeBlanc approached my Dad and asked if our family would be interested in purchasing his grocery store. Zelda, his wife, ran the business. They arrived from Canada many years before and raised their family in the apartment located above the store, if my memory serves, one daughter and me—four, or five boys. Both Leo and Zelda both spoke with a French accent; it was charming to hear them speak. The basement was converted into space utilized as a grocery store. The location was at 271 Castle Road, Bass Point. From 1950 to 1964, my Dad, Chester Baldwin, was proprietor of this small emporium. We had a refrigerated deli case with a variety of cold cuts and cheeses. Dad served breakfast and lunch. Most of the customers were town workersby definition "The Townies." Comments from the guys were "Chet we don't come here to see you, we just come for your famous coffee." I can still picture my Dad leaning on the faded yellow Formica counter, conversing and laughing with his faithful customers. Dad would heap the bacon on the grill and turn the eggs, cooking them to perfection. At least the customers thought they were good. Smoke clouds would fill the store; different cooking smells would permeate the air. A place that exists in memory and legend, for me that place is Nahant."

#### **Marine Science Lecture Series**

All are welcome to attend the next Evening Lecture Series, at the Marine Science Center at Northeastern University at East Point. Dr. Jeremy Long, Northeastern University Researcher, will speak about "The Art of War in Marine Life" on Tuesday, February 13th, at 7:00 p.m.

Plants and animals in the sea evolved complex offensive and defensive strategies, long before the creation of the first human militia. Finding your next meal and avoiding becoming someone else's next meal, are critical components of oceanic survival. These components created unusual and surprisingly sophisticated weapons in marine life, including chemical warfare, espionage, fortification and retreat. For example, some seaweeds detect enemies remotely and some invertebrates produce yucky chemicals. This talk will highlight these and other recent discoveries of defenses in marine prey and why they are important to us. Dr. Long is a postdoctoral researcher at the Marine Science Center. 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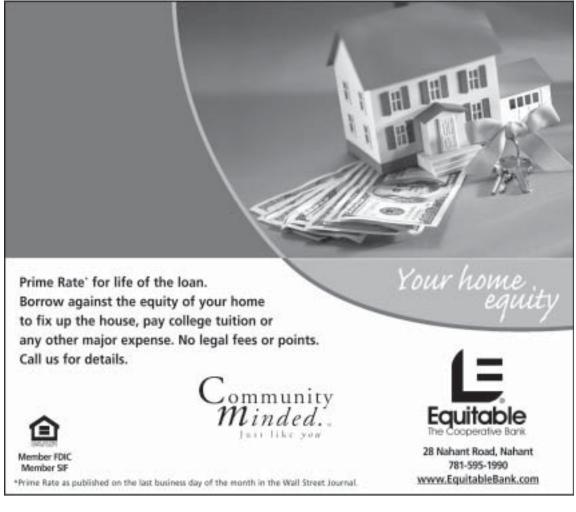
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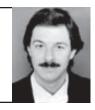
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#### Not feeling well? Should I Exercise?

This mild winter has spoiled us, but life's stress still compromises our immune system and makes us more susceptible to colds, virus and flu. After all, it is still cold and flu season. What do you do if your not feeling well? You may be asking yourself, "Should I exercise?," Here are some guidelines to follow:

First of all, what are your symptoms? If they are all above the neck; a head cold, or sore throat, etc., moderate exercise is considered safe, as long as you don't have a fever. More intense workouts can be resumed, once you feel better and have no more symptoms. If your symptoms are below the neck; coughing, aches, tiredness, nausea, diarrhea, chills, swollen glands, you should take a break from exercising and start back exercising gradually, from light to moderate and allow two weeks before resuming intense workouts.

If you have a fever, do not exercise. Your body is using the fever to help get your immune system working faster, and hotter, to fight off the invading virus or bacteria. Don't divert its energy. Besides, you need to keep well-hydrated with a fever. Exercise would only dehydrate you further. Drink water, decaf or herbal tea, fresh juices, etc. Drink LOTS of fluids!

Intense exercise may make you feel worse. Moderate exercise, which doesn't raise your heart rate, or body temperature, is fine, if you feel up to it. Be aware of your stress level and recognize when your immune system may be compromised, as you are more prone to catch something then. Research has proven that regular exercise actually improves your immune system. Get extra sleep, when you feel your reserve is low. Eat healthy (remember minimum 7 fruits/vegetables a day) and take nutrition supplements like vitamin C, Zinc, Echinacea, as well as multivitamins, to keep your body's defenses strong. Be smart. Stay home and rest, when you need to, and don't forget to drink plenty of extra fluids. Get plenty of fresh air and avoid crowds. If you are sick avoid passing it on to others in the same way.

For gentle to moderate exercise during a cold or flu, try stretching, or basic yoga. Focus on flexibility and relaxation. Take an easy walk, if the weather permits. Return to your regular fitness program, as soon as you can, but take care not to try to make up for lost time, by overtraining and over-exerting, as you can drain your system and cause a relapse. Give your body plenty of time to recover. One formula is to exercise at a lower intensity, for 2x as long as you were sick. If you were sick 4 days take 8 days to build back up to your normal intensity.

Don't let this time away from your fitness plan put you off track. Make a plan for yourself, on how you will return to health and fitness. Use the above formula. We all try not to get ill, but if you do, recover wisely and get back on track quickly and smoothly. It is key to keep stress away. Find ways to simplify your life. Get enough sleep, eat nutritiously, supplement as needed, exercise wisely and stay healthy all winter!

There are a couple of different kinds of exfoliation techniques: manual or chemical. Manual exfoliation can be performed at home and is done with a product that has a grainy consistency. The granular ingredients rub the dead skin cells off the surface of the skin, leaving your skin radiant and soft again. Any brand is good. Be sure to use a different one for your body than you do on your face. The skin on your face is much more sensitive and thinner than the skin on your body. You could do more damage to your face, by using a product that is too harsh. My favorite retail product for the face is Origins – Modern Friction. It is a rice-based, granular exfoliant and enzyme together. It makes your skin feel soft as a baby's skin. Origins also has an fabulous Ginger Salt Scrub to exfoliate your body. Be careful if you use it, as it has a tendency to make the bathtub slippery. Do not over exfoliate. You should only exfoliate your face once a week and your body 2-3 times per week.

Chemical exfoliants are products that use chemicals and/or enzymes that automatically eat away at the dead skin cells. You have to go to a spa and have a skin care professional perform these exfoliation techniques for you. Going to the spa for a quick chemical exfoliant, can be just what you need, in order to get a little pampering for yourself this winter. If you don't have time, or can't afford the full facial, make an appointment for a chemical peel. Most spas offer Glycolic Acid, Lactic Acid, numerous types of enzymes, such as pumpkin, pomegranate or pineapple. Seaport Salon and Day Spa, in Lynn, has a fabulous 30 minute Glycolic Peel, with a Lymphatic Drainage Massage (a massage using pressure points), for \$30, as well as quick 15-minute Enzymes and Glycolic applications for \$25.

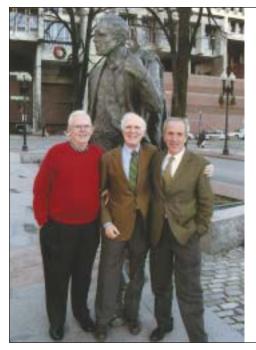

Stacie has also been coordinating a first-of-many other education-enrichment programs, Volunteer Reader Program. Working through Cora Long, volunteers will be in the school during specific reading times, at different grade levels. The Nahant Firefighters Association has generously donated an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to our school. We are in the middle of building the FY'08 budget for the entire school system. It is based on a complex formula that the DOE implements, to assure adequate funding of the schools. As with all other school systems in the Commonwealth, Nahant must make some hard decisions about how to fund our needs. The School Committee and administration are working together to build the best possible budget. There will be a public hearing about the budget at the end of the month, during which a discussion of needs and priorities will take place. In the meantime, the School Committee meets the 2nd and 4th Tuesday of every month and everyone is encouraged to attend, or watch from home, as all meeting are televised. Again, thank you for your continued support of students.

## She held a unique position as a woman in 19th-century America



Jessie Benton Fremont (1824-1902) was a Victorian original. As daughter of United States Senator, Thomas Hart Benton and the wife of the controversial explorer and politician, John Charles Fremont, she held a unique position as a woman in 19th-century America. She was instrumental in shaping her husband's career — particularly as the co-author of his famous published descriptions of the American West and through her informed involvement in Washington politics.

For part of 1849, the Fremonts lived in Monterey, as guests of Dona Modeste Castro. It is believed Jessie Benton Fremont was in Monterey during the Constitutional Convention.

### Fremont Cottage, 171 Willow Road

Fremont Cottage, (on Willow Road) with its tiny, diamond-shaped window panes and tree-trunk porch posts, opens a page in the history of our country, as well as of Nahant itself.

In the early days of the town, when the house was built by Edward B. Phillips, the lot covered much of the surrounding territory including Crystal (later Sandy) Beach and Nipper Point. These two areas played an important part in Nahant's fishing industry. The beach, which is near Tudor Wharf, was perhaps the most commonly used for landing. Here the fishermen brought in their catch, sometimes amounting to 1,000 pounds per man per day, and on the nearby slopes were the flakes used for drying fish.

Off Nipper Point, so called because of the numerous "nippers" or perch, found offshore, was anchored Nahant's fishing fleet, one of sizable proportions considering the smallness of the community. Later, when the town became a fashionable summer resort, yachts of the well-to-do residents lay anchored where once the fishing schooners had been.

In the mid-19th century, the cottage and the land were purchased by John C. Fremont, the "Pathfinder of the West," as a summer home for his wife and daughter. His wife, Jessie Benton Fremont, was the daughter of Thomas Hart Benton, prominent American statesman and senator from Missouri.

The Fremonts, like many of the other wealthy summer residents, contributed to the community's welfare. In 1863, when the town was unable to build a much needed road from Cliff Street to Summer Street and ways to Nipper Point and Crystal Beach, Mrs. Fremont generously paid for their construction and thus the present Willow Road came into being.

Although Mrs. Fremont and her daughter were fairly regular summer residents for a few years, John Fremont lived here only occasionally. One look at his spectacular life explains his absences, for John C. Fremont was one of the greatest explorers our country has ever known.

## Whither Thou Goest

A one-woman play based on the life and writings of Jessie Benton Fremont.

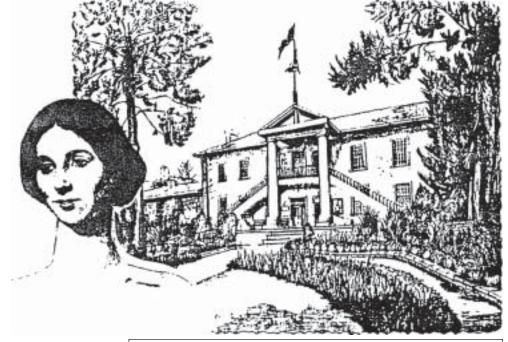
Jean Marie Ackermann's first play (1965) was about Jessie Benton Fremont. It was an epic — with everything on stage but the Panama mules. It won a Shubert Playwriting Award, praise from historian Allan Nevins, and a staged reading by the San Francisco Actor's Ensemble. Ms. Ackermann left playwriting to pursue a career an intercultural trainer for a multinational business.

In 1976, she returned to Monterey, a site of her early Fremont research. She began writing plays again in 1983 and last year turned to her old friend and subject. *Whither Thou Goest* reflects the added flavors of Ms. Ackermann's talks with Jessie Benton Fremont's nurse, granchildren and others who had known her in their youth.

Whither Thou Goest: Jessie Benton Fremont crosses Panama on muleback in 1849 to hold potluck salons in Monterey and help California become a free state and her mercurial husband become Senator. When their gold mines go sour, she becomes a popular writer to support her family. An enchanting hero.

Jean Marie Ackermann also penned another full-length play with Jessie Benton Fremont cast as hero entitled, *Jessie*. "Fremont and Jessie" was the battle-cry of their supporters in the 1856 Presidential campaign, one of the dirtiest on record. Jessie Benton Fremont enchanted everyone but Lincoln; her wit and grit brought her out of repeated chaos.

Credits include the following dramatic plays: A Pride of Heroes (1983, 1984, 1987), The Clean Fun Laundromat (1990, 1992), Auld Lang Syne (1984, 1989), Train of Events (1990) and Welcome Strangers (1992). Musical plays include Sing O Sing of Lydia Pinkham! (1988, 1989, 1991, 1992) and Princess (1991). Ms. Ackermann is a member of the Dramatists Guild.

## In her memoirs,

Jessie Benton Fremont (1824-1902), recalled that during her childhood she was often at the Capitol with her father, Missouri Senator Thomas Hart Benton, "postured" in the chamber that housed the Library of Congress, where she was free to browse among Thomas Jefferson's books and John James Audubon's bird plates. At home in St. Louis she became proficient in Spanish and French, and her education was completed at Miss English's Female Seminary in Georgetown. Her elopement at seventeen to John Charles Fremont, a handsome army surveyor of illegitimate birth, enraged her father. He soon forgave the pair, however, and Jessie later declared, "We could count on each other—my father Mr. Fremont and I, as one."

I was squawking about all the road blocks citizens and environmental activists crash into when dealing with giant energy corporations and outdated laws in Massachusetts. With my look, I can imagine, of

sheer exasperation, my friend began singing Kermit's famous song, in her best frog-like voice, and I laughed out loud; naturally, lightening up mood and feelings.

Thinking about the lyrics, I realized in a lot of ways this song is about anyone who cares about preserving the earth and our natural resources. And like anything important in life, it is never easy: a good marriage, career, friendships and raising healthy children all take a tremendous amount of effort. And I think most people will agree that these things are worth it, because the rewards can be immense. For me, raising environmental awareness and protecting our natural resources merits my energy. Each time I talk to a child, catch sight of a seal off Nahant's coast, or watch the sunset from my back porch, I am reminded it is worth it. And despite the obstacles, being in the heart of the environmental community is downright FUN!

And more fun is what SWIM hopes to bring to Nahant. We are brewing a resurging year for Safer Waters in Massachusetts (Nahant SWIM, Inc.) environmental group. Our principal goals are to: educate the community on environmental current events, collaborate with other local organizations (such as HealthLink, Friends of Lynn and Nahant Beach, and Alliance for a Healthy Tomorrow) to unify mutual efforts and respond to environmental emergencies by taking thoughtful, educated action, and create and implement a Nahant Earth Day 2007 celebration (pending town approval). The day will hopefully include enjoyable festivities for all ages, music, food and merriment. In response to several questions about S.W.I.M.'s opposition to the liquefied natural gas terminal proposals off Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary (see The Harbor Review Jan. 07); I will try to clarify this stance. SWIM is not against LNG terminals as a bridge to carry us to long-term, emission-free energy sources but is opposed to the locations. Carol Groom, a former Nahant resident, summed it up, "I think we're right! There are plenty of LNG applications out there and plenty of other locations. The industry doesn't have to be handed one that involves three marine sanctuaries (extremely rare and special), a habitat for endangered whales and sea turtles and generally some of the most prolific waters in the Western Atlantic. Not to mention the applicants' ignoring the presence of a radioactive waste dump and warnings by the Boston pilots that the narrowed shipping lanes will endanger everyone." The Department of Environmental Protection in Massachusetts continues to dismiss these facts as well. Because LNG is a depleting fossil fuel, offshore LNG terminals are a band-aid solution most assuredly due to cause irrevocable damage to endangered species and the fishing industry in Massachusetts.

## Escrow Money Held for Spring By Rob Scanlan, CMS/MMS/ACMS USMMS.

During the winter months, or lay-up period here in New England, escrow funds are put aside for the sea trials that are conducted when the spring rolls around and the boat, or yacht, is launched. Over the past 12-14 years, I have been able to run gasoline, or diesel, engines in my prepurchase surveys, during the winter months. Engines built 6 to 8 years ago, have data ports that I can plug-in my SCAN-TOOLS or computers, to obtain the engine's history and operational readings. I then proceed on to my compression tests, as well as additional, independent test readings on the engines and generators. I will lubricate the shaft struts, cutlass bearings and stuffing box so I can run the engines in and out of gear repeatedly.

After full warm-up, I will read the helm gauges, but rely mostly on my own instrumentation gauges and computer read-outs. After all my tests are completed, I re-winterize the engines and genset. An escrow account is set up to hold funds for the sea trials, to follow later in the spring, to cover any problems that develop during the sea trials.

What happens after the yacht is purchased and money put in an escrow account is insufficient to cover addition mechanical or operational problems that might develop during the sea trial? You cannot go back to the selling party or broker and report that there are unforeseen or undetectable problems and that the escrow amount is not sufficient to cover the problems. You already own the boat or yacht.

Who makes the determination of how much should be held? In very pre-purchase survey I conduct, I make the determination, as the attending surveyor, not the selling party, not the broker and not my client, who is purchasing the yacht. This is made loud and clear initially, to all parties concerned, that it is I, the attending marine surveyor, who makes the determination of the escrow amount and that the money is not just for mechanical systems. No outside arbitrator will be involved and all parties agree to this.

I have never, ever had a situation, that escrow money I recommend to be held was not enough. I am retained by my client, the buyer of the yacht and this is where my allegiance is. Not the broker and not the selling party.

## The Nature of Nahant: A Visitor From The West By Linda Pivacek

It was mid-January, the weather was unusually warm in Nahant, and cherry trees were in blossom. Two Baltimore Orioles were still at my suet feeders, instead of seeking the warmth of southern climes.

I decided to put my work aside and see what other treasures I could find in this balmy weather. As I walked the wooded path in the Massachusetts Audubon Thicket, I realized it was winter after all, as I stared at the leafless tree limbs. The only signs of life were a Song Sparrow and a Cardinal, silently foraging. I began thinking about how I missed the fresh green leaves, flowers and bird song of spring. I wondered if that beautiful Wilson's Warbler was still around. It had been lingering in the Thicket well into December, due to the warm weather. It should have been in Central America by now, but my friend Tom Martin had recently seen it in the wood lot across Walton Road.

I walked slowly through the drab winter landscape, searching the underbrush for motion and listening for any sounds. Nothing. Then, suddenly, a flash of yellow and the familiar thrill of finding the treasure. I stood still; occasionally catching fleeting looks at the bright yellow setting off the black cap of the Wilson's Warbler. It was so out of place in this subdued winter scene. Then, there it was. The prize, out in the open. As I admired this gorgeous creature, it hit me. This Wilson's Warbler was different. I had never seen one so richly hued. The color was more golden, with an orange tint and the green back was infused with yellow and almost iridescent. I began to ponder the possibility that this bird could be a subspecies from one of the western states. Maybe that was, in part, the reason for wintering much later than expected.

After writing a few notes, I returned home and hit the books. Yes, this male Wilson's Warbler had the characteristics of the Pacific Coast subspecies, chryseola! This subspecies breeds in a restricted range in British Colombia and California and should be wintering in Mexico or Panama. My friend, Rob Kipp, a nature photographer from Marblehead came over and took some fabulous pictures - the documentation needed to substantiate this sighting to Massachusetts Avian Records Committee. Another friend, Rick Heil, an expert and extraordinary birder also came to see the bird and agreed that it was a western subspecies.

As of this writing, this exquisite little bird appears to be doing fine. Its main diet consists of insects, not easy to find in winter. However, Nahanter Henry Hall, owner of Wild Birds Unlimited in Danvers, has been generously providing mealworms for our visitor from the west.

Think about it. This little bird, less than 5 inches long and weighing less than 3 ounces, probably traversed the entire country. Amazing. There are always more questions than answers. If it survives the frigid temperatures ahead this winter, will it stay in the same location? Where will it go in the spring?

I know it's not a good idea to give a wild creature a name, especially when it is at risk. But I couldn't resist. Let's hope Willy makes it.

The nature of our beautiful Nahant continues to amaze and enrich.

### World Renown Dr. Sheldon Sevinor, Plastic Surgeon, Lecturer and Mentor

Twenty-nine years into his distinguished career as a plastic surgeon, Dr. Sheldon Sevinor has become a trusted resource of the national media.

The world-renowned plastic surgeon, who has offices at Union Hospital, in Lynn and the Copley Plaza, in Boston, has appeared on the Oprah Winfrey Show, Good Morning America, ABC World News, PBS, Eye on America, Good Morning America, CNN, the Discovery Channel, The View, Inside Edition and other national television shows.

Sevinor's appearance on The View, hosted by Barbara Walters, drew some of the show's highest ratings ever. In a two-part series, the View's production team followed Sevinor during a five-day period, as he performed plastic surgery on five different family members, all female, ranging in age from age 27 to 80 and representing three generations.

Video clips of the actual surgery were shown on The View. The five women, from an 80-year-old grandmother to the 27-year-old granddaughter, went through the procedures together. "They supported each other emotionally," said Sevinor. And they are all very happy that they did the surgery together."

Sevinor was also in the news for his plastic surgery work on a STAR 93.7 FM radio promotion in which he performed an ultimate makeover on the winning contestant.

Hundreds of people sought to have the makeover and the winner was Jo-Anna Robyn D'Apolito of Revere, who is a schoolteacher in Saugus. Sevinor performed an eyelid lift, a facelift, a neck lift, a chemical peel for wrinkles, and a breast enlargment.

"It changed her life," says Sevinor proudly. "People were in awe of the transformation." Born in Marblehead, Sevinor knew, as early as the age of four, that he wanted to be a physician. "My hero was my pediatrician, who was Dr. Arthur Berson," said Sevinor. "I used to see him take care of 30-40 kids in his waiting room. I said, 'how can one man be so talented and capable of making these sick children well. He's a hero. I always looked forward to seeing him."

Ironically 20 years later, Sevinor was doing a clinical clerkship in surgery at Beth Israel Hospital and Dr. Berson's son, Dr. Frank Berson, turned out to be the intern to whom he was assigned. "It was so ironic that all those years later I met my hero's son."

A University of Alabama School of Medicine graduate, Sevinor realized, during a clinical clerkship at Harvard Medical School, that he wanted to be a surgeon rather an internal medicine specialist.

"I'm the kind of a guy that identifies a problem and wants to solve it and see the results," said Sevinor. "I knew I wanted to be a surgeon."

Sevinor began his internship and residency in general surgery at Brown University Rhode Island Hospital and in August, 1972, an experience in the emergency room led to his decision to become a plastic surgeon.

"It was about 2 o'clock in the morning and I was called down to the emergency room," recalled Sevinor. "A 26-year-old man was in a serious car accident and he was brought into the emergency room. He was taken to the operating room and there was an entire surgical team waiting to work on him. The primary objective was to save this man's life. I left the operating room 10 hours later, while the plastic surgeon did his best to reconstruct his face. The plastic surgeon had to do four more surgical procedures on the patient's face and the result was absolutely remarkable. "It was so inspiring to me that I was determined to pursue a career in plastic surgery," he said.

Sevinor became chief resident in plastic surgery, at University of Florida-Jacksonville Hospitals, where he was trained in all aspects of plastic surgery.

"After spending almost 30 years in the art and science of plastic surgery, about 90 per cent of my practice is now cosmetic," said Sevinor. "Cosmetic surgery is only one aspect of what we do as plastic surgeons."

Sevinor has maintained the same philosophy since the day he began his career as a plastic surgeon. "My philosophy is that everyone in life must have a passion," said Sevinor. "My passion is cosmetic surgery. Everything that we do as plastic surgeons is visible. There's no room for mistakes. It's a total commitment. You can't give a little. You have to give 100 per cent. I'm totally committed to my work."

Sevinor continues to be in demand as a speaker and lecturer. He recently gave a lecture to Harvard Medical School students about the psychology of self-image from the perspective of a plastic surgeon. Sevinor is a Senior Fellow Mentor to students at Harvard Medical School.

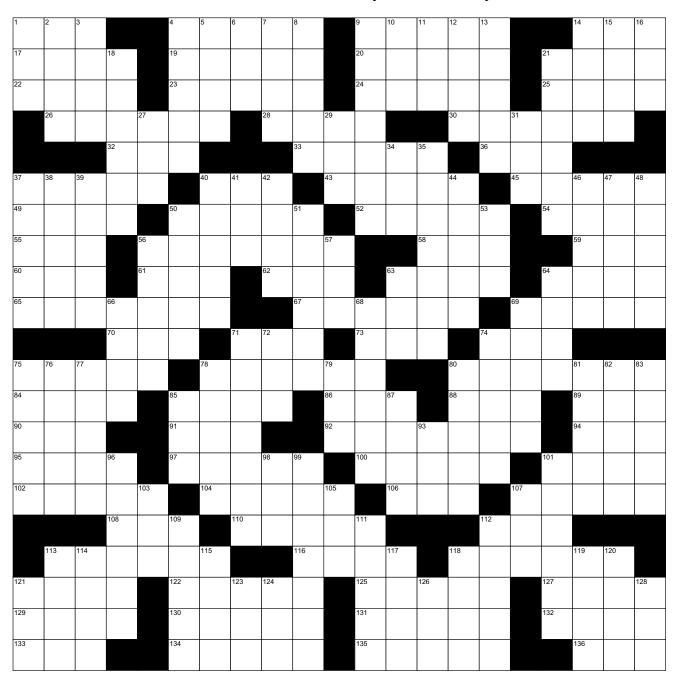

It seemed while looking out on this rainy first day of 2007 a particularly good time to reflect upon the year just completed.

### Our Year In Review...Looking Back at 2006

Much occurred and was accomplished during the last twelve months, but 2006 forever will be inextricably tied to the Nahant Life-Saving Station, and with and through it, the deepening partnership between the Town and the Trust. On the Trust's part, the commitment to undertake another major project, and the Town's willingness, in turn, to entrust that responsibility. A brief review of 2006:

- · In early March, the Board of Selectmen voted to approve and then signed a twenty-five year lease for the Nahant Life-Savings Station with The Nahant Preservation Trust, effectively turning over the stewardship of that property, for the foreseeable future, to the Trust.
- · In April, at the 2006 Annual Town Meeting, the Town voted to award The Nahant Preservation Trust a matching grant of \$450,000 to complete the restoration of the Nahant Life-Saving Station.
- · In early May, we had a small fundraiser at Kelley Greens hosted by Darlene Conigliaro and then later in the month of May, under the guidance of Carol Hanson, the second annual Nahant Arts at The Nahant Community Center was held.
- · In June, we were pleased to welcome Esther Johnson, Paula Devereaux, Mary Magner, Roz Puleo, Cathy Bartholomew, Kathy Ryan, Bumper Gooding and Emily Potts to the Board of Directors of The Nahant Preservation Trust. Paula Devereaux promptly assumed a leadership role in the Life-Saving Station Committee, with Mike Rauworth and Esther Johnson chairing sub-committees. The Life-Saving Station Committee is supported by a number of other Board members, Cathy Bartholomew, Mary Magner, Bernie Yadoff, Emily Potts, Sue Branga, Roz Puleo amongst others.
- · In early July, under the guidance of Cathy Bartholomew and Kathy Ryan and with the help of a committee that included Bernie Yadoff and Emily Potts, Amy Klee, Sue Branga, Andy and Roz Puleo, Mary Flannery and Chris Whitlock, we held the magnificent and beautiful Black & White Ball at the Paterson family residence.
- · In late July, we were notified that The Nahant Preservation Trust was awarded the prestigious Milestone in Heritage Preservation Award by the Essex National Heritage Commission. The award was given in honor of the 10th anniversary of the designation of Essex County as a National Heritage Area in recognition of the most significant preservation projects of the decade.
- · In August, we welcomed some 500 people to Short Beach for the fabulously successful Jamaican Me Crazy party. Jamaican Me Crazy was the brainchild of Bumper Gooding, and every aspect and detail of the party from set up to tear down was orchestrated under his direction (with more than a little assistance and a lot of understanding from Betty Gooding.)
- · In September, Roz and Andy Puleo with Nancy Wilson and the North Shore Striders, organized the first of two road races for the benefit of the NPT, a 30k Road Race.
  - · And in October, The Sea to Shining Sea Race for the benefit of the NPT was run, again under the direction of Roz and Andy Puleo.
- · In November, The Visions of Nahant was held at the Nahant Country Club for the benefit of The Nahant Preservation Trust under the guidance of Chris Whitlock and the rest of the Board of the Nahant Country Club.
- · And in December, we finished off the year by celebrating the 10th Anniversary of The Nahant Preservation Trust with as yet another party at North Spring, 66 Ocean Street, the home of The Nahant Preservation Trust founder, Stanley Paterson.

While all of this was going on, The Nahant Community Center at the Valley Road School continued to be run smoothly by the management team led by Karen Falat, Robert Wilson and Bob Steeves.

The Richardson Serenity Auditorium and Sears Multipurpose rooms continue to serving as a spaces for concerts, recitals, performances, lectures, shows, exhibitions, conferences, dances and classes and has been used regularly by Dance Dimensions, the Nahant Recreation Commission, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Scouts, the Parent Play Group, the Council on Aging and the Nahant Historical Society, to name but a few.

We will remember 2006 also for the loss of Vince Lique and John Cort, both of whom exemplified the highest form of Civic Engagement, dedicating their lives to social good.

### Our Future... Looking Forward To 2007 Challenges and Goals

- · We need to raise more than \$500,000 for the restoration of the Life-Saving Station.
- · We are committed to completing the next phases of the restoration of the Life-Saving Station, the exterior renovation of the garage building and the construction of the privy building and public shower.
- · We will continue to explore ways to increase educational programs, community access and other sympathetic long-term uses for the Life-Saving Station.
- · We are working with The Town to examine revisions to the Town and Zoning By-Laws, to look at the possibility of creating one or more historic districts and other controls, provisions to preserve open space, and a demolition delay for historically, or culturally significant properties.
  - · We hope to expand our role in preserving open space.

#### Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

My name is August Salliman, resident of 148 Wilson Road, Nahant and I am writing to you my observation, with a request if accepted, for publication in the Nahant Harbor Review. Through this article I want to share my thoughts and findings, to make our resident drivers aware of the hazardous intersection we encounter daily, as we enter the rotary at the end, or beginning, of the causeway.

It is a State Law; when entering the Rotary, incoming traffic should yield to motorists already traveling in the Rotary. But very often, drivers are zooming onto the Rotary without yielding to those motorists already in the rotary. Many times, I had to step on my brakes, when driving in the rotary, to avoid collisions, due to drivers entering the rotary and ignoring the posted yield signs.

I was very curious and took some time to investigate why drivers ignored the signs. I have been watching the traffic from the restaurant parking lot and it is interesting what happens. I came to the following conclusion and would like to share my thoughts with the general public.

There are traffic lights as well as yield signs, located at the Lynnway/US-1 North, just when approaching the Rotary, and also on Lynn Shore Drive/ US-1-South approaching the Rotary. (See attached illustrated picture taken from the parking lot of the restaurant across from the rotary).

Motorists traveling from Swampscott as well as from the Lynn way approaching the rotary, often having the "GREEN LIGHT" and in their minds, thinking they have the right of way and ignoring the yield signs. These traffic lights are probably causing more confusion.

As a Dutch educated Engineer; suggesting it would be much saver if these lights could be turned into "RED FLASHING" lights. This will certainly remind all drivers that they have to yield to traffic in the rotary. Maybe our Police force could be of service, if this is possible? Would they be able to bring this to the attention of the authorities responsible for these traffic devices and make the changes? These lights are also being used by pedestrians crossing the road, by using the buttons.

Thanks to our Nahant officer, who reacted so quickly on Monday evening, January 8th, at the Rotary, who witnessed how an accident almost occurred, when a taxi cab, coming from Lynn Shore Drive almost crashed into my truck.

Move away from the buffet. Fix your plate, and then step away from a table of finger foods to avoid grazing while chatting.

Savor the flavor. Eating slowly reduces your chances of overeating.

Drink H2O. Water is a healthy, no-calorie beverage. Drink plenty of it.

Trim it down. Eat smaller portions of food. Trim extra skin and fat from meat.

Party hard! Focus on family, friends, and activities rather than food. Stay active by participating in games or dancing.

Follow these tips if your goal is to serve healthy feasts to your guests:

Bake it. Broil it. Grill it. Consider healthy alternatives to traditional meats. Choose skinless meat or poultry and avoid fried dishes. Increase fiber. Serve whole grain breads, peas, and beans as part of your meals.

Easy on the toppings. Lighten your recipes by using reduced-fat or fat-free mayonnaise, butter, sour cream, or salad dressing.

Focus on fruits. Serve fresh, or canned fruits, instead of ice cream, cake, or pie. Transform high fat, high-calorie desserts by replacing whole milk or whipped cream with 1 percent or nonfat milk.

Serve low-calorie beverages. Offer guests sparkling water or diet beverages.

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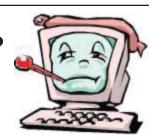
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
