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Landmark Civil War Exhibition Opens with Gala on June 23rd

The Nahant Historical Society has created an unusual exhibition, Sacrifice of Self: Nahant and the Civil War, which brings this fascinating era in our town and our country to life. Rare images and artifacts will be on display, many never on public view before, as well as poetry and music. These treasures will come from the Society's and private collections, as well as the archives of the Grand Army of the Republic Museum in Lynn, the Library of Congress, the Lynn Museum and Historical Society, the Nahant Public Library, the National Park Service Longfellow National Historic Site in Cambridge, the National Archives and Records Administration and the Navy Historical Center, both in Washington D. C.

Many years ago, Austin Brewin and William Twiss, late members of the Nahant Historical Society, gave life to this extraordinary venture. They researched the Civil War era extensively, which helped author the complementary book by Dr. Steven Eames. Sacrifice of Self is a lively retrospective that demonstrates how ordinary people both winter folk and summer residents coped with the far-ranging effects of America's greatest conflict. Not only does this exhibition chronicle soldiers' experiences, but also illuminates the support from those left at home and how Nahant took care of its own after the war. The integral part played by returning veterans, in the development of the town, is highlighted. Notable, were Mortimer L. Johnson and Sophia Dennis Hood, images courtesy of Nahant Public Library.

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Fighting the Obesity Trend By Sallee Slagle, Director, Dance Dimensions

Have you noticed the world is getting fatter? Certainly, Americans are. It is estimated, by the FDA, that 64% of all Americans are overweight, with more than 30% considered obese. That means that a majority of us are overweight. Our children are also overweight, with an estimated 15% of children ages 6-19 overweight, which is about DOUBLE what it was 20 years ago! Overweight as a child, makes it even more difficult not to be an overweight adult. Many worldwide health and fitness organizations are taking steps to combat this trend.

With approval from 53 health ministers in Europe, the World Health Organization (WHO) also adopted the world's first anti-obesity charter. The goal of this charter is to place obesity high on the public health and political agendas. It is a worldwide issue, which needs addressing on a nation-by-nation basis. This charter hopes to slow the rising obesity trend in the next 5 years and reverse the trend by 2015.

Although this trend has many contributing factors, our more sedentary lifestyles and food choices are the two most controlable. A new study, from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, shows that our poor diet and inactivity are becoming the leading preventable cause of death among Americans. Preventable means that you and I have to do what it takes to create an environment individually, socially and nationally, to create the change for this preventable unhealthy condition.

Smoking, still the number one preventable cause of death, has slowly declined since 1996. There is currently "No Smoking" in public buildings, at work, restaurants and bars. We have created an environment in which smoking is not convenient and quitting is encouraged and supported in our social environment.

We need to create a healthier food environment, so that poor diet is discouraged. I have seen the food industry start to offer more healthy alternatives and we have to continue. Our processed foods are also being newly labelled by the FDA, to help consumers make wiser choices.

So we need to make those wiser choices and understand how we can help others make healthy choices, as well.

Food is very social and we need to find ways to be social that include healthy food choices. The FDA is also looking at the possibility of restaurants including nutritional facts, along with their menus, to allow the consumer a better understanding of the choices. After all, we are eating out more and more. We should also all include healthy options for our guests, when you plan a function. It is a "good host" who provides abundant food, but does not encourage over-eating, or seconds. Why not abundant choice and greater health-concious menu planning?

DId you hear that New York CIty banned trans fats in restaurants? The NYC Board of Health adopted a municipal ban, to eliminate the use of any trans fat in restaurants, as of July 1st. Trans fats are an artificial ingredient, added in place of saturated fats, to many prepared, fried or processed foods. Trans fats have been found to raise cholesterol levels and contribute to heart disease. All fast-food restaurants in NYC now also have to display a calorie count for all menu items. Good idea!

Okay, now we need to get more active. I have told you about the 10,000 Steps program in the past. Google it. There is lots of data and support if you want to get started. Programs, like this one, are set up to help combat the the other side of our obesity trend, inactivity. This coincides with the Surgeon General's recommendation to be active 30 minutes everyday. There are lots of tools available, to help you get motivated and to be more active. Check out the President's Challenge. It has ways for children, family, inactive and even athletic individuals, to participate.

Get out and enjoy the wonderful outdoors and all the activities. Create a new, MORE active lifestyle for yourself and others around you. Teach your children the importance of good nutritiion and an active lifestyle. And be a good example for all. If we are to change this trend, it is going to be done by each of us individually influencing those we can, to help turn this trend around and make America a leader in health and fitness, with statistics showing we are getting fitter, not fatter.

Chiropractic Adjustments at Nahant Natural Healing By Dr. Devorah Feinbloom

As a chiropractor for 23 years, I know what it feels like, when a spine is both out of alignment and when it is aligned. When I am perfectly aligned, I have a sense of feeling light, both physically and mentally. Did you know that when the spine is perfectly aligned there is no effort in the muscles; they are relaxed? With perfect alignment, the weight of the body is transmitted around the curves of the spine, down through the sacrum, the femur heads and down the legs, into the heels. Here is a little experiment you could do to sense how your alignment is.

If you have a long 3-way mirror, like the kind in a clothing store, notice where the center of your ear is in relationship to the middle of the shoulder. If your ear is forward of the shoulder, or if you feel like it takes effort to hold your head up, your spine is not aligned. If, while you are standing straight, you notice all the weight falls into the balls of your feet, instead of the heels, your hip muscles are holding you up, not your bones. This creates muscle contractions and a feeling of fatigue.

One of the few reasons that women have osteoporosis, is that they do not stand in their bones. We all know people who, after wearing a cast, had to rehabilitate the weakened body part. When there is less weight in the bones, the wisdom in the body drives the calcium out and moves it to a place where it does experience weight-bearing. Poor hip and pelvic alignment, over time, will contribute to demineralized hips. Everyone knows someone who has fallen and fractured his, or her, hip. News and Views from the School Department

June is busting out all over! Driving over the causeway every morning at this time of year, reminds me of how fortunate I am to be able to come to work in Nahant. As with most towns in Massachusetts, Nahant experienced a slight increase in state aid to schools. Add this to the support of the School Committee, Finance Committee and the voters at Town Meeting, we are able to modestly increase our physical education, music and art programs at the Johnson School. The increase in the Swampscott tuition costs were not as high as the two previous years, but we do expect another major increase in that tuition, in FY '09. To that end, we have already begun to collect data, work as a team and articulate a 5-year plan based on an actual number of students, both here at the Johnson School and in Swampscott.

We also continue to analyze how we can best deliver the curriculum to our students. We have made significant progress with our writing and math curriculum and have just finished assessing our language arts curriculum. The School Committee, the Finance Committee and the Town of Nahant have been totally supportive of the instructional work we are doing. Thank you for that support.

The Student Council has been very busy over this past school year conducting a number of events. They voted to raise money for technology at the Johnson School and have held raffles, movie nights and even a Penny War. So far they have raised over \$1,300 for the school.

In addition to all these activities, the Student Council raised \$475 for the Jimmy Fund; they collected over 350 food items for My Brother's Table and 150 toys for Toys for Local Children (TLC). They also collected used eyeglasses for the Lion's Club. The 14 member Student Council consists of Derek Osbahr, President; Anna Greene, Vice President; Tyler Peterson, Secretary; and Aristana Scourtas, Treasurer. The sixth grade representatives include Anna Rusk and Corey Carmody. The fifth grade representatives are Joey Silva, Ian Munnelly, Haley McDevitt and Danny Marini. The fourth grade representatives are Emma Bartholomew, Ryan McDermott, Olivia Aswad and Shea Nugent. We would like to thank them for all their hard work and their commitment, not only to the Johnson School, but to the community, as a whole.

Kindergarten registration for the 2006-2007 school year has been ongoing and an information night for families was held on Thursday, May 10, 2007. If there is any one who missed this process, you can call the school and register now. Children must be 5years-old by September 1, 2007, in order to be eligible.

For accountability and bookkeeping purposes, we have established our own database of Nahant children, who attend either Swampscott Middle School, or High School. We are still waiting for about 15 families to respond to our request and follow-up letters will be mailed shortly. If anyone has not completed this registration process, it is urgent that you comply. If the forms are not on file with the Nahant Superintendent's office, students will not receive their final report cards from Swampscott Middle/High School.

The Johnson School Council is made up of two teachers, Ms. Tibbo and Ms. Haskell, three parents, Steve Toomajian, Mickey Long and Kathi Kougias, community rep, Joann Dunn and the principal, Denise Littlefield. Elections for two of the parent positions will be held at the beginning of June. Anyone interested should call the school office. One of our goals in the School Improvement Plan for the '07 school year, was to foster community involvement at the Johnson School. It is a shared belief that the community of Nahant has a wealth of talent and energy, that if channeled into the Johnson Schoo, would certainly increase opportunities and possibilities for our students. The position of Community Volunteer Coordinator was established by the School Committee, it is filled by Stacie Nardizzi and "volunteerism" at the Johnson School greatly increased. Guest speakers, the Woman's Club, the Historical Society, Junior Achievement, all added value to our academic program. We look forward to expanding these activities in the next school year.

As the school year comes to an end, the following dates are important: Sixth grade graduation is schedule for Monday, June 18, at 6:30 p.m., at the Johnson School. Swampscott Middle School final recognition assembly is Tuesday, June 19, at 7:00 p.m. and Swampscott High School Graduation is on June 3, 2007.

GLSS Offers \$25,000 in Grants to Local COAs Submitted by Margaret Gilligan

Greater Lynn Senior Services (GLSS), the Area Agency on Aging serving Lynn, Lynnfield, Nahant, Saugus and Swampscott, is offering funding of up to \$25,000 in grants to the local Councils on Aging, in those communities. The grants are being offered in the form of a \$15,000 competitive discretionary grant, targeted at meeting the goals outlined in GLSS' Area Plan on Aging 2006–2009 and a \$2,000 capacity building grant, available to each of the five Councils on Aging. The grants are being offered for fiscal year 2007–2008 only.

"The Councils are one of the best ways we can reach out to the communities we serve and directly affect the lives of seniors in our area," said Valerie Parker Callahan, a Planner at GLSS. "We want to help them help us work toward meeting the goals set out in our Area Plan." Every four years, GLSS publishes an Area Plan on Aging, which serves as a blueprint for the Agency's federally-funded programs and outlines key elements of its overall future direction. Specifically, the Area Plan's goals relate to housing affordability, mental health needs of seniors, and minority outreach. Funding could be used for a range of programs; for example, providing low-cost home repair services to seniors struggling to remain living independently at home, offering support groups around depression or loss, or organizing a multicultural event that celebrates and promotes diversity. Applications should be submitted, in conjunction with a community partner, or organization. Interested groups, or businesses, are invited to call the Nahant Council on Aging, at 781-581-7557, to discuss ideas for partnerships. A bidders' conference, open to all interested parties, will be held on Tuesday, June 5, at 10:30 a.m., at the Lynn Area Chamber of Commerce, 100 Oxford Street in Lynn.

This year, GLSS is also offering a capacity building grant of up to \$2,000 to each of the five Councils, to be used for anything that enhances their ability to better serve local seniors, including providing staff education and training, purchasing equipment, increasing revenues through grants, or fund-raising, or defining consumer needs.

"We are committed to supporting and working in partnership with the Councils on Aging," said GLSS' Executive Director, Roland Airey.

GLSS is a non-profit human service agency, created in 1976, as a federally designated regional Area Agency on Aging. It is also state certified as an Aging Services Access Point, a designation that authorizes GLSS to provide a broad range of programs to those 60 and older in Lynn, Lynnfield, Nahant, Saugus and Swampscott.

Since 1990, Fire Chief John Quinn, Fire Chief Ray Robidoux, Calantha Sears and Morris Poulin, have polished the engine, cleaned the Brass Fire Extingusher and the stanchions, before every Town meeting and other important Town Hall events. The "Eagle" is a 100-plus-years-old, wood-framed, wagon-wheeled engine, that was brought to Nahant in 1847. The engine worked by a tank filled with water, drawn from it by a "walking beam" pump, that forced the water from the tank through the hose. In the 1950s, the engine was repainted red and relettered in gold, to its present, nearly spotless condition. The Eagle was moved to the Town Hall for public display, for generations to view. 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HOOMPA Goes WEIGHTLESS

HOOMPA traveled with Jen McCarthy to NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. HOOMPA and Jen flew on NASA's C-9 airplane, to experience reduced gravity. Jen was representing the students at the Robert L. Ford School in Lynn. Her eighth-grade students designed a water droplet collision experiment, that NASA accepted to fly on the C-9. The students wanted to see what would happen to two water droplets that collided into each other in reduced gravity. HOOMPA flew 42 parabolas. During each parabola, the C-9 plane would fall towards earth at a 45 degree angle, which would cause the weightlessness. After falling for 30 seconds, the plane would then go up at a 45 degree

angle. While going up, HOOMPA and Jen experienced 2G, double gravity. HOOMPA and Jen had a blast!

Surrounded by Willows Beach

The earliest landing place used extensively on Nahant was around the present steamboat wharf at the end of Wharf Street, near Marjoram Hill, now often known as Tudor Wharf. This rocky point was called Nipper Stage, apparently from the "nippers," or perch, that were around it. It broke the undertow, as well as the force of the sea, from its full effect on the two sand beaches to the northward.

The farther one, in front of Hotel Tudor, is now called Willow Beach. Willow Road skirts it, and both were named from a fine row of old willows, long since gone, along the water side of the road. Newer trees have been planted, but are not yet of the size of the good old row of willows that old Nahanters remember. A steep bank, loose and shelving, was between the road and the beach. Gradually this was eroded by the sea and in 1900, the town built the concrete sea wall from abreast of where Valley Road enters Willow Road, eastward along by Hotel tudor.

In 1905, the wall was extended westward as far as cottages now standing on the water side of the road and in 1911, another section continued the wall to the eastward. The selectmen's report to the town, in the 1900 Town Report, says that all necessary relinquishments of private rights to the beach, or to the strip of land between the road and this sea wall, should be obtained before construction is started. The hotel Tudor always had a bathhouse structure on the bank and this privilege was continued. Later a claim was set up to another part of this newly made strip of land, but apparently it was not effective.

This Willows Beach was originally known as Dorothy's Cove, named for Dorothy Mills, daughter of James Mills, early Nahanter. Old maps of the town carry this name and it is a little unfortunate that old names with historic meaning cannot be kept.

Recently a new road was named South Field Road, a dignified title recalling Tudor and old Nahant. A little later the name was changed and the street now bears a pleasant name, Intervale Road, but with less meaning, either in appropriateness, or historic value. It runs next above Willow Road between Winter and Ocean Streets. Perhaps it is as good as Nahant, as those of Summer and Winter Streets.

Nahant's First Swimming Hole

Cow herders and shepherds were the first to live on Nahant. Christopher Lindsey, one of Farmer Dexter's employees, is thought to be the first inhabitant and his dwelling would have been some rough shelter. The next inhabitant of record was the shepherd, Hugh Alley. In 1635, at age twenty-seven, he had embarked from England for Boston. By 1640, he had found his way north to Lynn. Later, he married, sired eight children and had a farm at the south end of Market Street, in Lynn. Upon his death, he left his numerous heirs a flock of sheep and eight acres in Nahant, land he claimed had been granted to him, by the town, for his services in the Pequot War of 1637. This land had been fenced off by him, even though the town of Lynn had ordered that all of Nahant was common pasturage.

It was on this land, thought to have been located a short distance back from present day Cliff Street, that Hugh's son, Hugh and his wife, Rebecca Hood, built a home. They had been married in 1681. It was considered a prime place for a farm, having some of the best soil on the peninsula, good springs, abundant woods and a fine pasture. With fish at the front door and land and sea birds in great profusion, it would have seemed a northern paradise to the dwellers. Soon there were seven little Alleys living on the farm.

In 1670, the town had voted that an acre and a half of land, which had been given to Hugh Alley on Nahant, should be laid out to James Mills. This included a house and barn with the first right of refusal, should it be sold, being retained by Lynn. James Mills had lived at Nahant with the Alleys and had married the younger Hugh Alley's sister, Martha. He built a small cottage in a field southeast of where Whitney's Tavern would later stand. Mills lived there for twenty-six years with his wife and his three children: Sarah, James and Dorothy. Dorothy left her mark on Nahant topography. A bay on the south side of Nahant, tradition said, was her favorite bathing place and to this day people still swim in "Dorothy's Cove." In 1906, the town purchased Marjoram Hill, near Tudor Wharf, for a park and in 1905, the low land behind Short Beach for a public playground. Both of these purchases were urged during several years by George Abbot James, who served as town forester from 1881-1908, who added much beauty to Nahant by numerous plantings of trees and shrubs.

For the record, 3,474 Nahanters are white. We have 1,152 Irish Americans and 569 Italian Americans. We have 565 Nahanters with English roots, 346 German Americans, 220 Greek Americans, and 166 French Americans. As for Nahant Hispanics, they represent but 1.1% of the population. We do have two or more races representing but 0.8% of the population. As you can readily note, this a Gaelic and Garlic town!

Tree Stumps and Stump Removal by Kevin Howard

Removing a tree, for whatever reason, is only half the job. The other half, which completes the job, is removing the stump from the ground. This can be an extremely difficult and arduous task.

Stumps left in the ground not only look unsightly, but can take away from the look and symmetry of your yard. Left in the ground, they can spread disease to nearby plants and lawn. Also, there is always the chance the stump may begin to grow again, if not removed.

These problems can be eliminated with the use of special equipment which can grind down any stump to ground level, or to 10 inches below the ground, so that when the stump is removed, you can fill the hole level with topsoil and create a new plant bed, or lawn.

A stump cutter, or grinder, can, when used by a professional stump remover, literally make your stump disappear. The cuttings, or chips, created by the grinder, can readily be used as mulch.

A caution for those planning to plant another tree where your stump formerly stood, is to never plant a new tree within five feet of it. This will ensure proper root development. As a rule of thumb, spring and fall are recommended times to plant new trees and shrubs.

A group of us cared for this bird by feeding him mealworms, the only food suitable for an insect-eating bird. Henry Hall brought meal worms each morning and Carol Crawford, Nancy Carey, Ana Martin, Dawn Savino and I covered the rest of the feedings. This bright yellow, black and green bird brightened the drab winter landscape and won the hearts of many with his disarming tameness. He taught us about nature, migration, what birds eat and made us ponder about how birds survive winter's cold and where they slept. Ron's article expresses beautifully how this little bird touched our hearts. — Linda Pivacek

The story of Tong Ren by Ron Buckley

In the Chinese vernacular, Tong Ren can be translated as meaning community. One of the meanings for the word Tong means unite and Ren can stand for people, so Tong Ren can also mean uniting people in a common cause. Tong Ren is the name I have chosen for a small bird, the subject of this article. Read on and you will see why.

Most of us in New England have never seen a Wilson's warbler, and for good reason. The Wilson's warbler breeds from Alaska, eastward to Newfoundland and south to Southern California, New Mexico, central Ontario and Nova Scotia. This small yellow bird, about 4-1/4 inches tall, migrates to the tropics during the winter. A few must make their way through Massachusetts, on their way south and one, in particular, must have got a bit confused and decided to winter over in the small community of Nahant, Mass.

Nahant is a small peninsula that sticks out on the ocean to the North of Boston Harbor and is a known stop-over for birds migrating south. Most will continue on their long journey south, but this Wilson's warbler decided to hang around, in a small wooded lot in Nahant. Who can say why? Could it have been the unusually warm December and January we have had? Does global warming come to mind here?

I first heard about Tong Ren in early January, while on one of my morning walks. There is a small, wooded lot a block from my house, next to an Audubon bird sanctuary. I occasionally will see a birder, with binoculars, or camera, in the area. On this particular morning, there was an old acquaintance coming out of the wooded lot and I asked what she was looking for. She mentioned that a Wilson's Warbler was there and she was documenting it's plumage, since this particular subspecies had originated in California and had never been recorded in New England. She stated that, "this subspecies, documented by notes and photographs, is a western subspecies of Wilson's Warbler, which traveled here from California, instead of migrating south. Sometimes, this happens and we are not sure why." She was a member of the Massachusetts Audubon Society and had posted her discovery on the internet and now, a few of the other members, and local people had banded together, to help the little bird survive the winter. She had a small plastic container with worms, that she had purchased at a bird supply store and was putting the worms in a feeder, which had been donated by one of the neighbors. I asked if she would show me where the bird was, so I could get some pictures of it later.

We followed a small, winding path a short way into the wooded lot, to a woodchip pile and sure enough, there was the feeder and on top of the wood chip pile was Tong Ren. Tong Ren is a male Wilson's warbler, she explained to me, and that he should be in the tropics by now. Everyday after that, I would notice one or two cars parked next to the lot and I would know someone was in there, either feeding, photographing, or just enjoying the beauty of this very colorful and, might I add, very friendly little yellow bird.

I started visiting Tong Ren myself, at least twice a week and it is almost as if he got

to know me. When I got to the woodchip pile, there would be no sign of him but within minutes, he would be hopping around the pile, going to the feeder, looking for the expected worms, or just posing for a picture or two. I never did bring him worms, and I felt bad about that, but there where so many people feeding him I felt it was ok to just be there and experience the wonder of this beautiful little creature. My house is only a block away and many times, while I was outside cutting wood for the wood stove, he would fly over for a visit, land in a tree and watch me for a while. I will say, for some strange reason, he made me feel special.

The last time I saw Tong Ren was Monday, Feb 12. I had not been over to visit him for a while and we had a couple of really bad cold spells, but no snow, no bad storms as of yet, during this unusual winter. Many times, when I went for a visit, there would be someone else, either feeding, photographing, or just checking up on him and during

Tong Ren's brief presence in the wooded lot, I met many fellow birders, photographers and nature enthusiasts. All were there to see, help or just experience this remarkable bird. This time, however, I was alone. It was a sunny day and he was there on the wood chip pile. I think someone had been in recently and left some worms in the feeder. He was very active on this day and would come to within a foot of me. I sat on the ground and as I snapped away with my camera, he would hop up almost to my knee. I stood up and he flew very close to my face, as if he were trying to tell me something, like where are my worms? Out of impulse I held my hand out and extended one finger. He unexpectedly landed on my finger and pecked at my fingernail. To feel the feather lightness of this creature and his small feet clutching my finger, was quite an experience for me. I felt so close to this crazy little bird. I stood there for about twenty minutes and he landed on my finger 7 or 8 times. Each time the feeling of wonderment and beauty of this little creature engulfed me. I left the wood chip pile that day, feeling that I had truly been touched by nature.

On Wednesday of that week, Feb 14th, we had the Valentines Day storm. In Nahant, we had snow at first, about in inch, and then it turned to frozen rain and finally just pouring rain, till late evening. Then, in a matter of an hour or so, it all froze up again. Before the storm, I would see a car or two parked next to the lot every day. For the next few days after the storm, I saw fewer cars parked beside the wooded lot and by Saturday the cars disappeared. I had a bad feeling in my heart. I went over on Sunday and there was no sign of him. It also appeared the feeder had not been touched for a few days.

In the Sunday paper, there is a small column called Bird Sightings and this is what it said. "The weather being what it was last week, bird reports have been few. The over-wintering Wilson's warbler in Nahant has not been seen since the day of the storm last Wednesday." On Monday I finally saw a car in the wooded lot and it was the lady that first introduced me to Tong Ren. I asked her if he she had seen, or had any word on Tong Ren. She told me that he was last seen at around 4:00 p.m. the day of the storm, it had been pouring rain and he looked soaked. The sudden turn to below freezing was too much for him. Many of the birders were broken-hearted. She said that Tong Ren was being hand-fed by some of the people visiting him. This may explain his landing on my finger and his tameness. She told me that he would come out on the path that led to the woodchip pile and meet her, when she visited, and instead of making a bee-line to the feeder he would lead her down the path through the woods to the feeder. With tears in her eyes she said "he was a very special bird.

As for myself, he was a very special gift, a gift from nature. I have never had a wild bird land on my finger. He touched my heart and brought me closer to what really matters in life, taking care of each other. I will never forget the feel of his weight, or touch of his feet on my finger. It was a special moment for me. For this reason I named him Tong Ren, because you see, he brought a lot of people together, in a small community, to share in a beautiful experience. We were all united in a common cause to help him survive the winter. Sometimes in life, it's the small things that count, the day-to-day experiences we have, can take on a greater meaning, if we stop and take a minute to be in the present moment and to recognize the miracle of all living things, great and small. Thank you Tong Ren. I will miss you.

Nuclear Regulatory Commission Investigates Old Radioactive Wastes in Massachusetts Bay by Polly Bradley

The United States Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC), responding to an inquiry by Safer Waters in Massachusetts (Nahant SWIM), has written that it "is making efforts to locate information that will be responsive to your questions."

SWIM wrote on May 7, 2007:

"I am requesting that you investigate the potential dangers of (1) radioactive wastes from the refining of uranium for the Hiroshima atomic bomb, in Beverly, Massachusetts in the 1940s, and (2) radioactive waste dumped in Massachusetts Bay in the 1950s and 1960s, in the light of plans to build two liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminals in Massachusetts, adjacent to Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary and two state ocean sanctuaries, and almost on top of the old radioactive waste dump. The entire area supports six species of endangered whales and four species of endangered sea turtles, plus an important fishing industry.

"This matter is urgent, because construction on one of the terminals may begin as early as this spring. We request that qualified experts, not affiliated with the LNG companies, evaluate the dangers, and if the dangers merit still further investigation, that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission find a way to delay and, if necessary, stop these LNG projects."

On May 13th, SWIM heard from another source, that the Beverly company, Metal Hydrides, supplied almost all the uranium in the United States, during World War II. This report was forwarded to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for their analysis.

The National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) does not plan to hold a hearing on LNG and whales, but it was NMFS that suggested that SWIM write to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

The Yacht by Rob Scanlan, U.S. Marine Surveyor

A yacht is indeed a boat, but a boat is not necessarily a yacht. I do not fully agree with the dictionary's definition: "a yacht is a boat used exclusively for pleasure." While this is true, it is much more than that: a boat is only a yacht, when she has dignity, polish and class. Size or cost has little to do with her stature as a yacht.

I have inspected numerous yachts, no larger than twenty-four feet, capable of outshining boats of much greater size. I have been amazed by examples set by yachts costing less than that of the sail covers on "gold platers" nearby.

A yacht may be a racer, or a cruiser, constructed of any material and built in any year. She needn't be profuse of well-varnished brightwork, or fancy state-of-the-art equipment. In fact, she may not have any brightwork at all, if it is the nature of her own character. She does not have to belong to the ritzy yacht club, a yacht club cannot create a yacht; nor can any builder, try as he may.

It is her owner who makes a yacht from a boat, or conversely, who makes a boat out of a yacht. What a boat and a yacht have in common, besides being able to float, is the unique ability to reflect their owner's attitudes and degree of fortitude, patience, attention to detail and the desire for beauty and respect for things produced through his efforts. A yacht is the mirror of the owner's self esteem.

Jack Comfort's lovely memoir of his Nahant childhood (April 2007 issue) made me smile and remember my own halting lurch toward maturity, in the exquisite sunlight and snow and salt air that is Nahant; it was there, on Cliff Street and Vernon Street, in Swallow Cave and Joe Beach, in the voices of Shuermie Kettell and Ed Tarlov, in contemplating the dignity of cormorants and John Lowell, in the russet afternoon light of the library and wild storms on the cliffs, that I began, finally, to be a man, late in life. My

I first began to write essays there, an inky habit that has led to much joy, for me, at least. I stopped being so absorbed with myself and started listening to the wonder and grace of others-the secret of happiness, perhaps. I savored parades and fireworks and the startling speed with which Nahant police ticketed the automobiles of visitors. I marveled at the greed and violence of the Angiulo clan. I admired the goose who held "The EDIC of Lynn loaned me \$150,000, because they traffic at bay one morning near the police station. I wandered in the cemetery, wondering knew how important a flagship restaurant is to the city. The at all the stories now vanished behind the stars. I grinned as Prescott Kettell walked his dog, by driving along slowly, behind the creature as big as a horse. I counted the pebbles at Forty Steps Beach and gave up after ten thousand. I counted shards of china washed up from shipwrecks. I found a green heron's nest near the Johnson School. I played thousands of hours of basketball under the sharp eyes of blackbirds. I walked the edge of the island a hundred times and never once saw the same place twice the same way.

> It seems to me, now nearly twenty years removed from my years in Nahant, that there is a place for each of us, where we reach a little deeper into who we might actually be at our best, a place which has nothing necessarily to do with nativity or length of tenure, but everything to do with receptivity. For some, it is a city, for some a mountain village, for some a foreign land, for some the hometown they return to with new eyes, after miles and years. For me, it was Nahant.

> For all the difficulty of access, the redolence of dank low tide, the hair-raising cost of living, and the mournful lack of an excellent pub with medicinal Guinness stout, I remember the town with a smile and a pang. I took up residence there in my twenties, a selfish boy and left in my thirties, far more awake to the zest and courage of other people, to their general grace under duress and to their general generosity. For that, for those years, I am grateful forever.
