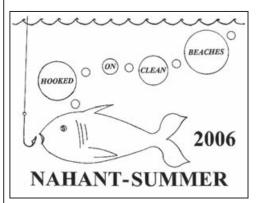

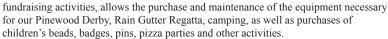
#### Nahant Pack 50 Cub Scouts Fundraiser Sucessful

In his remarks to depositors, midyear of 1996, Equitable Cooperative Bank President, Arthur M. Horgan, announced the opening of a branch office in Nahant, at 28 Nahant Road. He noted that this new office has been well received by the townspeople.



Mr. Horgan pointed out, the former

bank that occupied the building, prior to Equitable Bank, had been closed for three months and Nahant was without a full service bank, during this period.

"This should never happen to a community," Mr. Horgan said. "Let me assure you that we intend to be here for the long haul—keep in mind that we have been serving the Lynn (area) community for over 120 years." he added.

Originally the building served as an office for Winthrop Savings Bank, which merged with the Atlantic Bank, then Pioneer Financial, a cooperative bank, which then became Bank Boston. Recognizing an opportunity for growth potential, Mr. Horgan seized this fine time and, after remodeling, on June 22, 1996, the Nahant office of Equitable Bank was opened.

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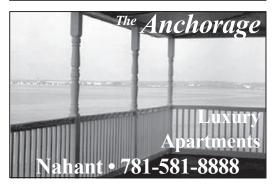
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#### Nahant's Zachary Liscio Honored by North Shore Chamber of Commerce

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#### News and Views from the School Department by Dr. Denise Littlefield, Nahant Superintendent and Principal

The construction company, W.T. Rich, continues to do a fantastic job on our building project. Things are progressing quickly. It now appears that both the new addition and the renovation project will be complete enough to allow for all students to be in their new classrooms on the first day of school. To that end, the first day of school for students, for the new school year, will be Monday, September 11, 2006, a break with our traditional, before Labor Day school opening. The FY'07 school calendars have been sent home with students.

As with most towns in Massachusetts, the Nahant School Department experienced a very slight increase in state aid, less than needed for the expected increase in fixed costs and negotiated contracts. With the increase in the Swampscott tuition costs, the School Committee had very little choice in how to fund needs of the Johnson School. With fairly steady enrollment for the school in general, several grades have a fewer number of students than others. For the past few years, there have been 2 classroom teachers at each grade level. In building this year's budget, enrollment per-grade-level was considered. As a result, for the next school year, grades 1, 3 and 5, will each have 1 classroom teacher.

When I became principal in the fall of 2001, there were 24.7 teaching and administrative positions at the Johnson School, with 7 full time teaching assistant positions. In the fall of 2006, there will be 16.8 teaching and administrative positions, with 4.3 assistants. We continue to analyze how we can best deliver the curriculum to our students. We have made significant progress with our writing and language arts curriculum, and have just finished assessing our mathematics curriculum. The School Committee, the Finance Committee and the Town of Nahant have been totally supportive of the instructional work we are doing. We are in the process of implementing an updated math curriculum, complete with new and improved math textbooks and resources, because of that confidence. Thank you for that support.

John Walton and Tom Coffey did not run for a second term on the School Committee. This is my opportunity to thank them publicly for their fiscal ideas, administrative support and hard work. (I will miss those Friday evening and Sunday afternoon meetings, but I am sure their families won't). The School Committee has 2 new members, Jim Devereaux and Christine Kendall. I look forward to our work together, making responsible fiscal decisions, completing the building project and providing a state-of-the-art education for the children of Nahant.

As noted in a previous column, Misha Zhykov, a fifth grader in Mrs. Dunion's homeroom, was the winner of this year's Johnson School Spelling Bee. He represented our school at the regional spelling bee, sponsored by the Lynn Item, at the end of March and I am proud to report that he finished in 6th place. Misha competed with students in grades 6, 7, and 8 (in addition to grades 4 and 5), so some of his competitors were 3-4 years older. Congratulations!!!

A new Johnson School record was set during the annual math-a-thon. The students raised \$2,807.30 for St Jude's Cancer Research Hospital for children. 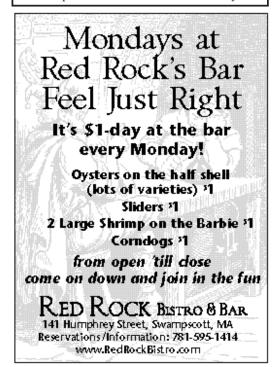
Kindergarten registration, for the 2006-2007 school year, took place on Wednesday, May 17. If there is any one who missed this process, you can call the school and register now. Children must be 5 years old by September 1, 2006, in order to be eligible.

For accountability and bookkeeping purposes, we are establishing our own database of Nahant children, who attend either Swampscott Middle School or High School. To that end, letters will be sent to Nahant families, requesting updated information about their children, our students in Swampscott. Accurate completion of the forms that are being sent home will be required, prior to the start of the next school year, in order for a student to begin classes.

The Johnson School Council is made up of 2 teachers, Ms. Salt and Ms. Dunion, 3 parents, Steve Toomajian, Josh Antrim and Kathi Kougias, community rep, Joanne Dunn and the principal, Denise Littlefield. One of our goals in the School Improvement Plan for the "07 school year is to increase parent and community involvement at the Johnson School. It is a shared belief that the community of Nahant has a wealth of talent and energy, that if channeled into the Johnson School, would certainly increase opportunities and possibilities for our students. We are seeking an individual(s) to become the Community Volunteer Coordinator, working with me this summer to set up the structure and conditions that will facilitate 'volunteerism' at the Johnson School. I am hoping that I can make a modest stipend available for that position. There will be additional and specific information in the next Harbor Review. In the meantime, if you are interested, or would like more information, please call the school at 781 581-1600.

As the school year comes to an end, the following are important dates: Sixth-grade graduation is schedule for Tuesday, June 13, at 6:30 p.m., at the Johnson School. Swampscott Middle School final recognition assembly is Thursday, June 15, at 7:00 p.m. and Swampscott High School Graduation is on June 4, 2006.

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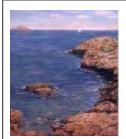
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#### Flooding Makes Beach Clean Up Urgent Submitted by Polly Bradley

Debris from the record-breaking floods in May, is expected to make the June 3 Nahant Beach Clean-Up especially important. All citizens, young and old, are urged to turn out, to help pick up trash, litter and other junk that has washed down from overflowing rivers and storm drains on the North Shore. The Clean-Up will take place on Saturday, June 3rd, from 9 a.m.to 2 p.m. The rain date is Sunday, June 4th.

Meet at the Lowlands parking lot, off Ward Road, across from Nahant Life-Saving Station. Sign up there to get your free collectible T-Shirt (as long as the supply of 400 lasts.) Volunteers may walk to Short Beach, or Black Rock Beach (Doggie Beach), or a shuttle bus will transport them to Long Beach (the causeway), Canoe Beach, Tudor Beach, or Marjoram Park Beach and the Wharf. For those who put in a good morning's work, a free hot dog lunch awaits, back at the Lowlands. Students will earn up to 5 hours community service credit.

Wear sturdy clothing and boots, and bring gloves, rakes, and shovels. Anyone who has pick-up tongs on a long handle, or a boat hook, should bring it, to help get trash out of those beautiful, but pesky, beach roses. It is important not to disturb wildlife any more than necessary. In particular, people should watch for birds' nests in areas with grass and shrubs and should steer clear of those locations. There will be team leaders at each beach.

The Nahant Beach Clean-Up is sponsored by the Town of Nahant and coordinated by the Nahant Woman's Club, with participation from many other Nahant groups, including Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Girls Club, Open Space Committee, Recreation Commission, Nahant Garden Club, and Friends of Lynn and Nahant Beach. The Nahant Department of Public Works and the Nahant Harbormaster will be offering strong support, as well as the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation, on Long Beach.

It is hoped that this will turn out to be the First Annual Nahant Beach Clean-Up, and eventually Nahant may join in the CoastSweep project, sponsored by the Massachusetts Office of Coastal Zone Management (CZM). CoastSweep is part of an international campaign, organized by the Ocean Conservancy. According to CZM, "Participants all over the world collect marine debris and record the types of trash they collect. This information is then used to help reduce future marine debris problems."

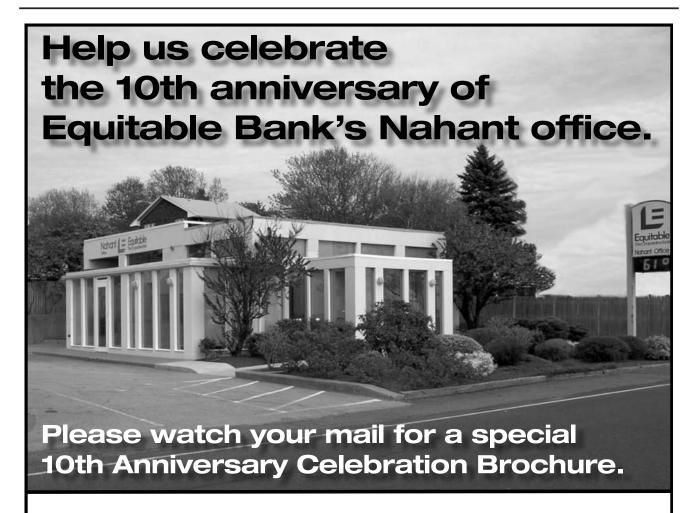

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#### Summer Fitness by Sallee Slagle, Director, Dance Dimensions

Well, summer is finally on its way! The long winter and soggy spring may have you feeling like you're not ready to bare more of your body in the summer styles and beach wear we love. Well then, it's time to crank up your workout and cut down your calorie intake. You can see changes quickly, but lets do it wisely.

Remember, if you cut out too many calories, your body will slow your metabolism down and you won't burn calories as quickly. Eat more wisely. Cut down portion sizes at meals and definitely DON'T skip breakfast! Choose high water-content foods, like fruits and vegetables. Avoid added fats like mayonaise, whipped cream, most sauces, gravy, many cheeses, butter and so on. Replace them with low-fat alternatives, or cut them out all together. Also, cut back on processed foods as they have lower nutritional value and are often higher in fat and sugar, as well as chemical additives and preservatives. Cut out refined carbohydrates, or limit quantities of breads, bagels, muffins, cookies, cakes etc., or better still, cut them out. If you miss them, or crave them, add a portion 1 or 2x's a week. Buy fresh sandwich meats, or better yet cook your own sandwich ingredients. Cook lean proteins like fish and chicken breasts and make extra for sandwiches, or salads. Use wraps and pita breads for sandwiches. Find good healthy snacks like nuts, yogurt, fruits and baby carrots to satisfy your between meal cravings.

Drink plenty of water. If you don't like water, try adding a lemon or a dash of orange juice for flavor. Mix seltzer water and juice for a refreshing healthy "soda." Avoid other carbonated sodas and sugar laden sports drinks, fitness waters and iced teas. These can add a lot of calories so be sure to read labels. Oh, and stop any alcohol consumption for a month, if you can, or at least drastically reduce it to dry white wine, occasionally. Alcohol adds in many extra calories with no nutritional value.

Okay, now for fast results, you must crank up the calorie burn at the same time! Workout everyday but be sure to alternate your strength training with weights, with a day of other activity the next day, or alternate upper body days with lower body days. Try to add mini-workouts during the day, 10-20 mins in the morning, or over lunch. Walk the stairs, or the block. Do a 5-10 min abdominal routine with a 5-10 min back and buttocks routine, everyday. Stretch 10-15 mins at night to loosen stiff, or tight muscles and relax you to sleep well, too.

Be sure to include cardiovascular training 3xs a week. To supercharge your regular workout, add intensity. Try a short more intense workout, 1-2x a week. Run short sprints, or walk at a quick pace and then walk to recover. Repeat alternately. Add jumping (plyometrics), or bounding; jump rope, skip and leap to advance your workout. Try a new workout for added challenge. Never let your workout become too routine. If want to see changes, you need new challenges.

You can take 1 day to rest each week, or do a restoring and revitalizing yoga class on that day. Don't give up if you miss a day, or indulge in a calorie rich meal, just carry on the next day. If one day is not balanced you have to eat less and/or burn more the next day. Don't let it get away from you. Stay active and eat smart. 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#### Blurred Vision: A Warning Sign of Diabetes by Dr. Neil Gross, Opthalmologist

"How sweet it isn't!" Perhaps this is something the late, great Jackie Gleason might have said about diabetes. Today, everyone seems to either have diabetes, or know someone who has it. Undiagnosed diabetics have a high blood-sugar and may experience thirst, sudden weight loss, or excessive urination. A less well-recognized, but equally important, symptom of diabetes is blurred vision.

Blurred vision may be due to many problems. However, the sudden onset of prolonged blurred vision is consistent with diabetes. A high blood-sugar induces nearsightedness. This occurs because chemical (osmotic) forces drive excess sugar from the bloodstream into the lens. A swollen lens changes the way light is focused. It shifts the normal focal point closer to the nose and forces one to hold an object more closely, in order to see it clearly. Usually, this shift is temporary. Once the blood-sugar is regulated, the lens shrinks and vision returns to baseline.

Blurred vision is a valuable warning sign—it informs us that something is wrong. So, if you are suddenly unable to see TV, without sitting closer to the screen, realize that the cause may be diabetes. If distant road signs suddenly seem to be more out of focus to you, an elevated blood-sugar could be the reason.

Unfortunately, not everyone with diabetes develops blurred vision. People who already have blurred vision from macular degeneration, or an old glasses prescription, may not notice a subtle change in their vision from high blood-sugar. Patients who have undergone lens removal, during cataract surgery, cannot be affected by fluctuations in blood-sugar since the artificial lens, that is placed in the eye after the natural lens is removed, does not swell under any circumstances.

Many medical studies have confirmed that early diagnosis and treatment of diabetes minimizes the risk of bleeding, swelling and other eye complications associated with diabetic eye disease. So, if you have blurry vision and think that you might have diabetes, make an appointment to see an ophthalmologist, at your earliest convenience. The doctor can help you determine whether or not you have diabetes. Remember, an early exam could help you to preserve your vision and prolong your life. Otherwise, if you already have diabetic eye disease, don't despair. In my next two articles, I will describe the remarkable lasers and medications, now available, that are being used to save the eyesight of diabetics.

#### Yoga and Arthritis Submitted by Patricia McCallum, Pathways Yoga

It is estimated that seventeen million Americans suffer from some form of arthritis. Ranking second only to heart disease as the most widespread chronic disease in the U.S., arthritis effects one out of eleven Americans.

Arthritis means inflammation of a joint, especially the joint lining. The two main types of arthritis are rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis. It is important to have guidance from a physician or therapist in order to avoid compounding the problem.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a chronic disease characterized by painful swelling, fatigue, stiff muscles and joint deformity. Early immobility comes from tense muscles rather than joint damage, in the patient's efforts to avoid pain.

Osteoarthritis is regarded as a process of aging. It is the result of prolonged wear and tear on the joints, repeated injury, or joint abuse from obesity. It usually develops slowly with stiffness and pain, almost never with swelling or redness.

Yoga with its emphasis on gentle movements, stretching and relaxation training a natural for the arthritic person. You may prevent deformity by maintaining joint movement and muscle strength.

Isometric exercises are valuable, with the student using prolonged contraction before relaxation, and not simply "wiggling" the part. The student should be aware that the flexor muscles are predominantly strong (i.e.: the muscles on the palm side of the hand) and should not be allowed to freeze in flexed positions. Opposite movements, such as stretching the hand open, are helpful.

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## **Preparing Your Boat for Sale** by Rob Scanlan, Mastr Marine Surveyor

There is a strong financial incentive to prepare a boat for sale. Detailing a boat is the single most important investment of time, energy and money, a seller can make, because a clean and shiny boat sells faster and for a lot more money. I strongly recommend that a seller enlist professional assistance to do a quality job. Sellers that opt to do it themselves, should consider the following tips:

- 1. Wash and wax the exterior, polish any metal, refinish any woodwork, repair, or replace, canvas and cushions.
- 2. Clean the interior thoroughly, steam clean, or replace carpets, clean upholstery, or reupholster. Unwanted odors must be removed, especially from the head, so get some air fresheners and disinfectant. Any personal effects, or items that make a boat look cluttered, should be removed.
- 3. After the initial cleanup, schedule regular wash-downs, to keep a boat in top shape. Consider cleaning the exterior/interior every two weeks and the bottom should be clean of any marine growth and a new application of bottom paint applied.

In addition, a seller should consider having me conduct a marine survey, before launching a marketing campaign. Knowing the strengths and weaknesses of a boat will save time, energy and money later. I can determine if a boat needs repairs and furnish a list of items that need to be fixed, for the boat to be in top condition. Buyers are looking for a boat that has been well maintained, with receipts and maintenance log available; so uncovering any potential structural or mechanical problems early, gives you the opportunity to have them corrected and command your selling price.

Making any necessary mechanical repairs at the beginning of the sales process, will prevent costly delays during the negotiations and closing. Boat owners incur monthly expenses such as mortgage payments, insurance, slip and/or storage fees and maintenance. Also, non-use can be more costly than using a boat regularly, which increases the likelihood of additional repairs. Consider the following tips:

- 1. A boat must be in top mechanical condition, before launching a serious marketing campaign. Have the engine(s) and generator checked out by me and make all necessary repairs. Clean and paint the engine(s) and steam clean the bilge.
- 2. All equipment, wiring systems and electronics must be in good working order. Repair or replace items that are not. Also, ensure that all safety items, such as navigation lights, horns and bilge pumps are in good working order and all USCG safety gear is current.

Remember that all offers are subject to a marine survey, sea trial and mechanical survey. Buyers must be satisfied by a boat's condition, performance and eye-appeal, to complete the purchase.

#### Nahant Sailing Program Launches 2006 Season

Ahoy, mates, it's time to set sail again in Nahant. Registration for the Nahant Sailing Program is under way, marking the start of the 23rd season of community boating in the commonwealth's smallest town. Wannabe sailors, who didn't make it to one of the May registrations, can do so on June 10th, at the Little League Field, from 8:30 to 11 a.m., or at the sailing room on the Town Wharf on June 22nd and 23rd from 9:00 to 11:00 a.m. Sailing Program Committee member, Dunbar Livingston, will be accepting registration forms and payment, at the Little League Field.

The season fee is \$195 per student, or \$155 for those parents, or guardians, who participate in the related Saturday-morning bottle-and-can drives. The racing program fee is \$235. Instructors arrive June 19th to prepare the fleet of Super Skunks, 420s and the cruising boats. Racers begin June 26th, and classes for everyone else start a week later, on July 5th. The program ends Aug. 18th.

Classes include Introduction to Sailing, which runs Monday, Tuesday and Friday from 9 a.m. to noon. It is designed for children who are at least eight years old by July 1, or entering the third grade, and who have little, or no boating experience.

Activities include safety procedures, around the dock and in the boats, how to rig, getting acquainted with the harbor waters and games related to understanding wind direction, what makes the boat go—and on hot days—a practice capsize drill.

The Beginner/Novice Class is held Wednesday and Thursday, from 9 a.m. to noon and Tuesday, from 1-4 p.m. It is for children with boating experience, or who have been in the program for at least one year, are at least nine years old, or who feel they are ready for basic sailing instruction, using the Super Skunks. Activities include a review of introductory activities and skills necessary for skippering a Super Skunk.

The Intermediate/Advanced Class meets Monday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 1-4 p.m. It is designed for children who have been in the program for one or two years, perhaps longer, and who understand the basic principles of sailing. Some students will have more experience and ages will range from nine to 16. This class will practice boat-handling skills, with games and drills.

The 420 Boat Handling in Light Air Class is Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, from 9 a.m. to noon. It is for children who can competently sail a Super Skunk in moderate wind and who want to sail a 420 dinghy in light air. The class is also for those sailing 420s for the second year and who are ready to skipper in moderate wind.

The Cruising Class is Monday from 9 a.m. to noon, and Wednesday and Friday from 1-4 p.m. It is for more advanced students, seeking an alternative to the racing curriculum. These sailors will practice boat-handling in the larger daysailers, navigation and charting a course, to sail to various destinations in local waters. The Cruising Class is also an opportunity to sail on larger boats with qualified Nahant skippers.

The Racing Class is Monday, Thursday and Friday, from 1-4p.m., as well as at scheduled regattas. It is for competitive children who want to race. Participants must have demonstrated the ability to sail a 420 dinghy, in moderate, to heavy air. There are three practice sessions per week and scheduled racing. Parents must be available to assist with transportation, when necessary, to and from regattas.

Adult Classes and Family Night Sailing is held Tuesdays, from 6-8 p.m. Due to the July 4th holiday, the first class will meet Thursday, July 6th. Depending on ability, participants may choose either instruction, or supervised free sail, using the boat of their choice. Adults may sail with other adult participants, or with their children who are enrolled in the program. Sailors in this class must arrive promptly at 6 p.m. to attend a briefing and obtain boat assignments. The cost is \$95 for Nahant resident adults, \$150 for Nahant families, including children enrolled in the program.

All participants must wear sneakers or boating shoes and a life vest (PFD). The program provides basic PFDs but sailors can bring their own, which should bear their names marked in permanent ink. All children should wear a bathing suit and bring a towel and T-shirt the first day, for the swim test. Children attempt the swim test in pairs. Although they wear a PFD, it must be removed while treading water. Instructors conduct all swim tests at the Town Wharf. Sailing rules and procedures will be discussed the first day and a copy sent home. Medical forms must be completed at registration, or turned in at the sailing room, in an envelope, on or before the start of the program.

Fledgling sailors will have plenty of opportunity for fun and games, while learning to sail, said Sailing Committee member Karen Falat. According to Falat, all parents are expected to either assist with one Saturday can-and-bottle drive, or pay the full class fee.

The Town budget funds 20 percent of the cost of running the non-profit sailing program. Since expenses for equipment maintenance and replacement continue to increase, the remainder of necessary funding is derived from fees, gifts and donations, volunteer labor and the monthly can drive. Representatives from 3-4 families are needed to work together at each can drive, from 8:45 to 11:45 a.m. on the third Saturday of each month. "Every can counts," said Falat. The program offers limited scholarship assistance. More information about the assistance can be obtained during one of the registration sessions, or by calling Livingston at (781) 599-5515 and leaving a message. The scholarships cover half the registration fee. Fees for non-residents: the Introduction, Beginner, Intermediate/Advanced, 420 Light Air, and Cruising classes are \$275; Racing Class, \$300; and Adult Evening Class, \$150 per person or \$250 for a family.

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#### **Q&A** by North Shore Physical Therapy

Q. Now that summer is here, there is lots of work to do in the garden. The weeding, pruning, and trimming almost seem endless. What can I do to protect myself from injury?

A. We all know that it is very easy to overdo it, while gardening. As was mentioned in this column last month, take plenty of breaks and drink lots of water, to avoid dehydration, especially in the heat of summer. You also might want to do most of the heavy work in the morning, when the temperature is cooler and you have more energy.

When weeding, as with planting, it is important to avoid bending your back for a prolonged period of time, so position yourself on the ground in kneeling, hands and knees, or sitting. You may find a gardening stool helpful while weeding. Avoid unnecessary reaching, or twisting, by getting close to the area you are weeding and turn your whole body to face it. Keep your elbows partially bent and your forearms positioned in neutral (thumbs facing up.) Avoid twisting your palm up and down repetitively, while weeding. Consider using a weeder, to minimize strain on your forearms and elbows. As with any tool, a lighter weight tool, with a larger handle, is easier to manage for arthritic joints. Grasp the tool gently, in order to decrease your muscular effort and minimize fatigue. Remember to change your gardening position and task, at least every half-hour.

When pruning or trimming, keep your elbows close to your body and work below shoulder level, whenever possible. If you must work overhead, do only a few minutes at a time and be sure to use both arms, whenever you can. Using a lightweight pruning tool, with a large handle, will help minimize the strain.

It is very easy to strain your back while gardening. Try moving your back in the direction opposite to what you have been doing. For instance, if you had been bending forward, straighten up and take a short walk. Be sure to ask for help, if there is something heavy to lift. Whenever you are lifting, keep the object as close to your body as possible, and keep your back in a comfortable neutral position (halfway between rounded and arched.) Tightening your stomach (abdominal muscles), by gently drawing your belly button in toward your spine, is helpful during any activity which challenges the back. Do not hold your breath while contracting your abdominal or while lifting. In general, it is better to push an object, than to lift it or pull it. Use a wheelbarrow whenever possible.

Stretching after gardening helps to loosen tight muscles; ice can help to decrease pain. If you find that your pain persists, consider coming for a physical therapy consultation, to broaden your knowledge about body mechanics while gardening.

As a private music teacher, I am continuously asked this question by students, friends and family alike. Somehow, many people have gotten the erroneous idea that you either "have it, or you don't". Musical talent, that is. My answer to them-at least my short one is, "I wouldn't be in the business of teaching, if people couldn't get better. It just wouldn't be right."

There is no question that some people display musical talent, leanings, abilities, etc., from an early age. And yes, it is true, that those people tend to progress well- especially if they learn the techniques of their instrument and practice. I've also met many students with "God-given talent", who weren't willing to learn, improve or practice. Frankly, they lacked self-discipline. And although they might have had big dreams, they never really went anywhere with them. I've also taught students who started from beginners, with less "natural talent," worked hard, kept up their practice, had a positive attitude and got incredible results from lessons. I've literally seen beginners blossom into professionals, right before my very eyes. After a substantial period of training, I've seen students who were meek, unsure of their talent and what they wanted to do with it, ultimately choosing a major in music at college, or a career as a performer.

I find that with the rise in popularity of shows like American Idol, there is much more of an emphasis on being a STAR, than on what it really takes to improve your abilities. Even if your goal is to sing a song at a birthday party, you need to spend time learning the song! If your goal is to eventually get a "gig" with a band and play clubs, parties, or weddings, you'll need to be able to sing and/or play for about four, 40 minute sets. That's a lot of singing and/or playing! Of course, if you're taking lessons just for fun and to add the fulfillment of a creativity activity to your life, the requirements and regiments are less. Still, it's the same principle as improving your tennis serve; just get out there and do it! A little commitment, repetition of the motion, consistency in the practice...these all produce results.

## Life-Saving Station Project Thanks Nahant for CPA Vote submitted by Michael Rauworth

Nahant has stepped up to the plate once again, for the restoration of the Life-Saving Station. At this year's April Town Meeting, a floor vote approved funding of \$450,000, under the Community Preservation Act. The Town's strong vote is very important, because private fundraising has to generate even more than the \$450,000 CPA award—and attracting that level of donations depends on showing broad community support.

The members of the Nahant Life-Saving Station Management Advisory Committee—Esther Johnson, Paula Devereaux, Henry Clausen, Harold (Bumper) Gooding, Mary Magner, Roger Peterson and Roz Puleo—deserve special credit and thanks, for all they've done to bring the project so far. They get the credit for obtaining last year's CPA grant and they put in place the application for this year's one. Moreover, the MAC got a new roof installed,



stopped the deterioration of the buildings and made the exterior appearance of the main building very respectable. The MAC is an official committee, established by Town Meeting several years ago. Its work has gone hand-in-hand with the efforts of a stalwart group of NLSS volunteers whose skill and energy have positioned the Station for a great new life.

This grant funds the public share of the work that remains, before the facility can come back to life. That includes lots of work on the interior of the main building, plus an overhaul of the garage structure, to make it useful for a range of activities. And it'll create a building that will be both old and new at the same time—an historically accurate replica of a small coal shed/privy that stood on the site, for much of the early life of the Station. The replica building will house the beach restrooms, required by the Town, as part of the redevelopment of the site.

A few weeks before Town Meeting, the MAC turned over its "hands-on" role in the Station, to the Nahant Preservation Trust. NPT will operate the Station under a lease from the Town recently approved by the Selectmen—an arrangement very similar to the Valley Road School. But as it comes into the picture, NPT has the good fortune to have the input and participation of the members of the MAC and the cadre of NLSS veteran volunteers.

So, the Station enters a new phase, and makes ready for its life as a working asset for the community. A good moment to thank the voters for their strong vote of confidence in the Project and a very good moment to salute those hard-working NLSS volunteers and MAC members—the people who've made the Station's bright future possible.

## North Spring: A Retrospective submitted by Michelle Coyle

Around the 1880s, Nahant was the glory of the North Shore. Affluent Bostonians were erecting elegant summer homes. Picnickers, seeking refuge from the heat of the city of Boston, could sail or take a steamer to the peninsula and enjoy a popular pleasure park, known as Maolis Gardens. Just to the east of these gardens, North Spring provided a cool spot to gather, quench the thirst and listen to the gentle waves lapping rock ledges. Contiguous to this haven, lay land which in 1884 was undeveloped and controlled by the Nahant Land Company. Around 1892, Samuel Eliot and Jessie Motley Guild, of Boston, commissioned the building of a magnificent Colonial Revival home, aptly named the Samuel E. Guild House, by J.T. Wilson, an active Nahant builder.

Upon the death of Mrs. Guild in 1941, the home was sold to a group of Roman Catholic sisters, with whom it remained until 1967, when it was acquired by the Paterson family. Stanley Paterson, an industrialist, writer and historian, restored the home and handcrafted the ornate plaster ceilings in the Adams style. This style of domestic architecture, named after Robert Adams, a famous 18th century British architect, challenged traditional Georgian architecture, introducing graceful, curved elements, such as swags, vines and garlands, with predominantly pastel colors, such as blues, lilacs, coral, or green. Mrs. Paterson, a gold medal ice dancer from England, shared her husband's love of architecture and was responsible for choosing the colors throughout the home. These elements are being preserved through a preservation restriction/easement, running in favor of the Nahant Preservation Trust, a local non-profit preservation organization. This historic easement will preserve the magnificent ceilings, as well as the core of the principal structure, which is defined as the area from the dining room to the ballroom. Any reconstruction/renovation would also need to be compatible with the significant architectural elements of the main house, as approved by the Nahant Preservation Trust.

North Spring, located at 66 Ocean Street, named for the original picnic spot, represents a piece of the rich history which surrounds Nahant and the Boston area. The special family, or individual, who will own North Spring in the future, will ensure a continuation of the love of architecture, respect for open space and preservation of historic properties, which have been shared by those who have lived there.

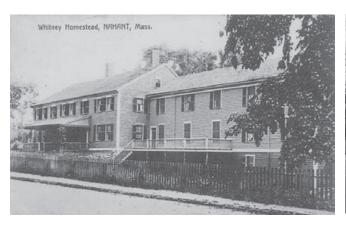

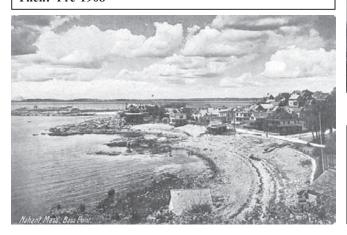

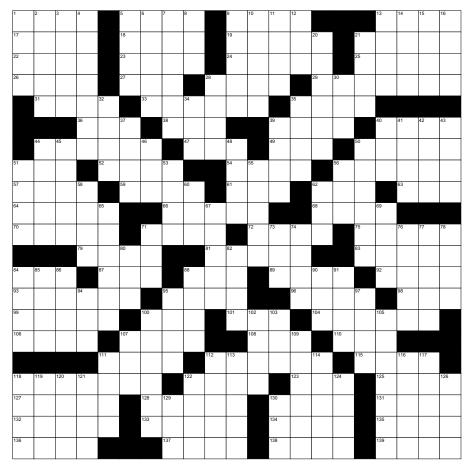

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#### Hearings on Two North Shore LNG Proposals To Be Held in Salem in Mid-June

Two separate proposals are under consideration for building liquefied natural gas (LNG) terminals in North Shore waters. Separate hearings will address the two proposals. Safer Waters in Massachusetts (Nahant SWIM) will meet on Monday, June 12th, at 7:00 p.m., at Northeastern University Marine Science Center, in Nahant, to determine SWIM's strategy for testifying at the two hearings.

Northeast Gateway Energy Bridge and Algonquin Gas Transmission have requested a Corps of Engineers permit for a deepwater LNG import terminal, 13 miles southeast of Gloucester and almost as near to Nahant, Swampscott, Marblehead, Beverly, Salem, Manchester, Winthrop, Boston and Hull. A hearing on this proposal will be held on June 15th, at 6:00 p.m., at Salem State College Library, Charlotte Forten Hall, 360 Lafayette St., Salem. Registration for the hearing will start at 4:30 p.m.

Neptune LNG has filed its own plan for an offshore gas facility, seven miles southeast of Gloucester. The Corps of Engineers hearing on this proposal will be held on June 21st, at 6:00 p.m., also at Salem State College, with registration starting at 4:30 p.m.

Hearings will also be held in Gloucester on June 14th, on the Northeast Gateway project and on June 22nd, on the Neptune LNG project.

Safer Waters in Massachusetts (SWIM) plans to attend the two Salem hearings and submit comments. SWIM also planned to attend a hearing of the Massachusetts LNG Siting Commission on May 22 at the State House in Boston. Other proposals are under consideration in Massachusetts, for LNG terminals in Fall River and on Outer Brewster Island, in the Boston Harbor Islands, a part of the National Park Systerm.

SWIM's meeting on May 8th, on liquefied natural gas (LNG) proposals for the North Shore, was exciting and well attended. Angela Sanfilippo, of Gloucester Fishermen's Wives Association, spoke passionately on issues of human and environmental safety and disruption of fisheries and other marine activities. A proponent in the audience raised vociferous objections, and a lively give-and-take resulted, with much audience participation.

SWIM met again on May 13th, in order to prepare for the public hearings coming up so quickly. SWIM has many more questions than answers—and wants to be sure the officials at these hearings also ask these questions. We are compiling questions, which we'll then prioritize and consolidate. SWIM has been coordinating with Save the Harbor/Save the Bay, which is leading an LNG coalition, concerned about the potential dangers to people and to the environment.

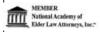
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
