## 350 Rings for the Climate Awareness Nov. 1st at Nahant Village Church

On Saturday, November 1st, All Saints Day, beginning at 1:00 p.m., members of the Nahant Village Church will ring the church bells 350 times, to show support for the United Church of Christ's Climate Awareness Campaign.

Why 350? 350 parts per million is the amount of carbon in the atmosphere, that is sustainable on a long-term basis. Currently, our atmosphere holds 385ppm and we're headed towards 450ppm. As stewards of the earth, we hope that by ringing the bells to proclaim our love of God's creation, it will be an inspiration to other communities to make the necessary changes in our behavior, so that our grandchildren will enjoy a clean, healthy planet.

Environmental author, Bill McKibben, of the Hancock UCC Church in Lexington, has launched a world-wide movement to make the number 350, the most recognized number on the planet.

The Climate Awareness Campaign began in the Commonwealth, on June 22nd, with bells ringing from the First Congregational Church in Williamstown and the Dennis Union Church in Dennis. On the 4th of July weekend, the bells of the Old North Church in Marblehead and the First Congregational Church in Sheffield were rung.

If you would like to help ring the bell 350 times for the environment, come to the Nahant Village Church on Saturday, November 1st at 1:00 p.m. and join us. The church will be open for reflection and prayer during the bell ringing and until 3:00 p.m.

## Boston Globe Reporter to Discuss Casino Gambling at Nahant Public Library

The Boston Globe's investigative reporter, Sean P. Murphy, who has written hundreds of stories on the casino industry since 2000, will give an illustrated presentation on the debate over bringing casinos to Massachusetts, at the Nahant Public Library, on Sunday, November 9th, at 3:00 p.m., in the Reading Room.

The talk, which will be followed by a question-and-answer period, is sponsored by the Friends of the Nahant Public Library and is free to the public. Refreshments will be served and all are welcome.

Mr. Murphy is an animated speaker, who draws his listeners into his topic. His discussion of the "Big Dig," given at the Library last year, encouraged the audience to ask questions and led to an absorbing discussion.

On November 9th, Mr. Murphy will discuss the most compelling arguments for and against introducing casinos into the state, why Indian tribes have a special status and the state and national politics of this most controversial issue.

Mr. Murphy has been a reporter and editor at the Globe since 1987.

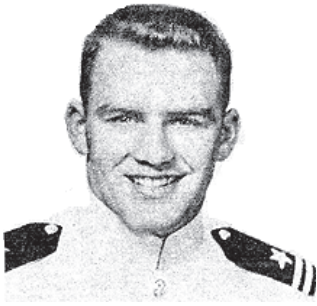

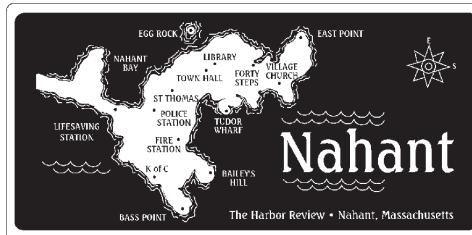

By the shifting dune of the sand at Cape Cod.

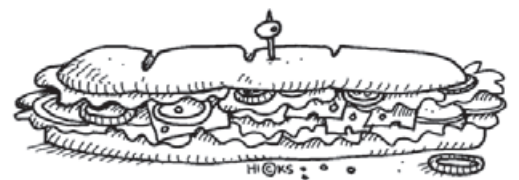
Under the platinum night sky. While Boston city sleeps,

### SWIM Update

Safer Waters in Massachusetts (Nahant SWIM, Inc.), will meet Wednesday, November 12th, at 7:30 p.m., at Northeastern University Marine Science Center. All are welcome. Help tackle your favorite environmental problem!

### Acid Rain Permit

A "Draft Phase II Acid Rain and Operating Permit" is being requested by the coal-fired Salem power plant, upwind from Nahant. The comment period extends until November 21, 2008. SWIM has requested a public hearing, saying "SWIM is very much concerned about the dangers of acid rain, both to the ecosystem and to human health." HealthLink, the Marblehead and Swampscott environmental group, has been working since its beginning to clean up the Salem power plant and is following the issues closely, according to Lee Mondale, who spoke at the October meeting of the Nahant Woman's Club. SWIM will work closely with HealthLink in its efforts.

### No Boat Discharge

SWIM is still working on getting a Lower North Shore No Discharge Area (NDA), to ban all sewage discharge from boats locally within the three-mile limit. Kathryn Glenn, North Shore Regional Coordinator of the Office of Coastal Zone Management, reports that she is scheduled to attend the October 28th meeting of the Saugus Board of Selectmen, to urge them to endorse the NDA. Nahant and Swampscott have already approved the NDA; after Saugus, only Lynn and Revere will remain. No one seems to be against it, but it requires coordination from all five towns, as well as the state government and seems to have been on everyone's back burner. The current economic situation seems to be pushing it ever farther back. SWIM will keep dragging the NDA issue back to the front burner.

### Endangered Mammals

The International Union for the Conservation of Nature (IUCN) has quantified the well-known trend toward extinction of species. (See [www.iucn.org](http://www.iucn.org).) At its recent meeting in Barcelona, Spain, it released IUCN Red List, stating that at least 1,141 of the 5,487 mammal species on Earth are known to be threatened with extinction. 836 mammals are listed as "Data Deficient" and could be threatened. The IUCN is also assessing the endangered status of birds, fish, amphibians and other animals and plants.

SWIM's big concern is the endangered marine mammals - the whale species found in Massachusetts Bay and Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary: the humpback whale, the fin whale, the sperm whale, the sei whale and the blue whale. Of the reptiles, four endangered species of sea turtles are found in these waters: the loggerhead turtle, Kemp's Ridley sea turtle, leatherback sea turtle and the green sea turtle.

This is only a sampling of the environmental problems that face Nahant — and Earth. We need to tackle them for the sake of our children and grandchildren. SWIM will continue to "act locally, think globally." For more info: [nahantswim@verizon.net](mailto:nahantswim@verizon.net), or 781-581-0075.

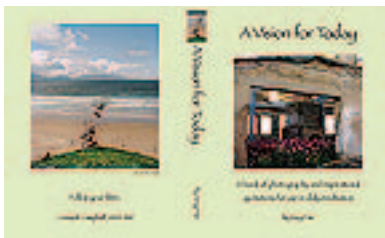

This year our assembly will be held on Monday, November 10th, at 9:00 a.m. The assembly, which is a program of poetry, music and choral readings, will be followed by a luncheon honoring Nahant veterans. This assembly really makes the Veterans' Day holiday very meaningful to the students.

At the end of October, the school will launch the Johnson School Extra Curricular Activities Program. We are beginning with six activities, which range from yoga to knitting. We have bookmaking and marine biology, too. Flyers have gone home and students are in the process of making their selections. We will have more information, as the program unfolds.

Tuesday, October 14th, our instrumental music program took another giant step to implementation. Parents of the nineteen budding musicians met with Mr. Carmada to discuss instrument rental program. Music lessons are slated to begin on October 20th.

It's also election season at the Johnson School. Student Council elections are under way. The voting will be held very soon and the results will be reported next month. The Student Council will have twelve representatives, from grades 4, 5, and 6. They will meet alternate Wednesdays, after school. This year Ms. Blythe Purdin will be the Student Council advisor.

## Good news from the Johnson School

Over the past several months, there have been numerous positive developments at the Johnson School, that will support the school's improvement efforts, despite the challenging times that are well-chronicled in the press, particularly regarding educational funding. We are fortunate to have a town that is supportive of the school and an administration and teaching staff that are dedicated to delivering a quality education to Nahant's children.

### Completion of the Renovation project

With school opening in September, a new school library/media center was introduced to our students, with new books and computers, and with a library aide to support it. Also in September, the school and the town implemented a new parking and traffic-flow plan, which reduces congestion on Castle Road. Thanks to town officials, renovation committee members, and especially the townspeople of Nahant, for their support in past town meetings, the renovation project has been a huge success.

### Encouraging results on MCAS scores

The Johnson School has attained a 2008 Composite Performance Index (CPI) rating of "high" and a positive Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) ranking, receiving the highest accountability status awarded. Three of the four grades improved their performance in 2008 versus 2007. Two of the three returning student classes improved their performance above their respective results from 2007. Approximately 89% of the grade/subject categories scored within the top half of Massachusetts, versus 55% in 2006. The average rankings for two of our four grades are within the top 30% of Massachusetts schools, versus only one grade in 2006. As has been the case for several years, the performance of our departing class (sixth grade) has been noteworthy. Our sixth grade Math and English scores both reflected 21% of our students at an advanced level with both subjects, scoring above 67% advanced or proficient. These postings place the sixth grade of the Johnson School within the top 30% of Massachusetts schools, while for comparative purposes, the Marblehead Charter School sixth grade results place them in the last 40% group. Further encouraging is the sixth-grade improved above their fifth-grade scores from last year.

Clearly, there is always room for improvement and attaining a top 30% ranking does not represent the goal line, however improvement each year and attaining Adequate Yearly Progress represents the dedicated efforts of all of our teachers and aides, Principal Mulcahy and Superintendent Lisi are indeed paying dividends.

### Nahant Education Foundation

The Nahant Education Foundation is committed to building a brighter future for our kids. This dedicated group, with less than a half-year of existence, has presented the school with a check of \$27,100 for the purchase of twenty new computers, Smart boards and software, to support the school's curriculum. This also includes training for our teachers to effectively utilize these tools in the classroom.

I am certain you will hear more promising news from the Nahant Education Foundation, regarding future plans, but any story regarding the Johnson School would be incomplete without acknowledging their dedication to improving our school.

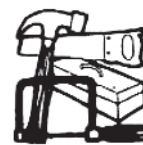

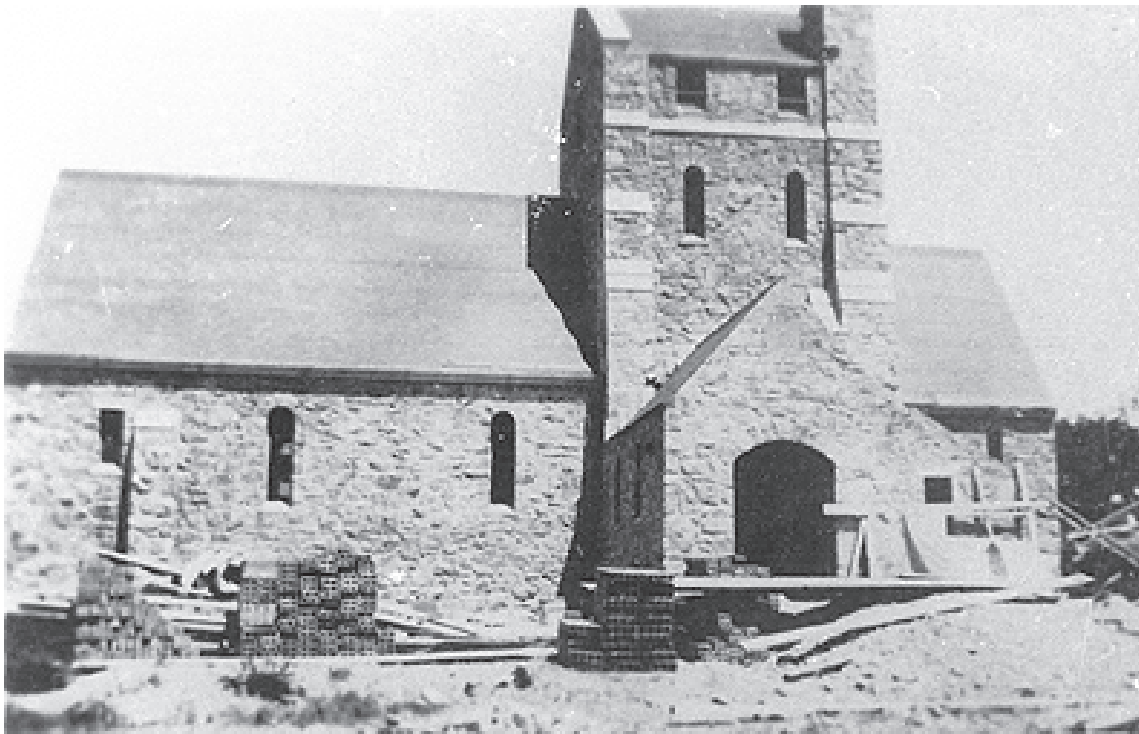


## Building Ellingwood's Chapel 1919-1920



At a Special Town Meeting in 1918 the town accepted the offer of Mrs. Luther S. Johnson to build a cemetery chapel, thus carrying out the last wishes of her late husband. It was started in 1919 and dedicated on May 30, 1920. It was named Ellingwood Chapel in the memory of Joanna Ellingwood Green, and Joseph Johnson, Jr., who were Luther Johnson's mother and father. Luther Johnson's grandfather was Joseph Johnson, son of the first Johnson on Nahant. Luther Johnson was a shoe manufacturer in Lynn, leaving benefactions to the Lynn City Hospital and other Institutions. He always loved Nahant, his birthplace. In 1894 he presented his Nahant G.A.R. comrades with a flag which they carefully kept and is now in the Nahant library.

During the same year 1919 Mrs. Francis H. Johnson presented the town with the gateway on Nahant Road in memory of her husband. Mrs. James H. Beal gave a sum sufficient to build the fence and gateway on High Street, the old end of the cemetery. The town itself made an appropriation to move the police station across the street to its present location and to grade and improve the new parts of the area, and on Decoration Day, celebrated May, 31, 1920, the work was completed to about its present condition. This year (1928) this year the town proposes a further extension along Nahant Road up to High Street.

## Nahants First Official Cemetery

Designers Cram and Ferguson use a Simple Norman Style Construction

Mrs. Luther S. Johnson gave Ellingwood Chapel in 1918, leading to the design of both the building and grounds by the firm of Cram and Ferguson, between 1918-1919. The existing stone walls and gates, on Nahant Road and High Street, were part of that plan, as were tree plantings and pathways. A small stone tool house (1919-1920) was also designed to match the chapel, set behind it into the eastern side of the hill abutting High Street.

Ellingwood Chapel and its ancillary structures - the Tool House, stone walls and gates, were all built with granite quarried in Nahant and were designed in simple Norman-style. Almost cruciform in plan, the 22' x 70' chapel was constructed with random-sized, rough-hewn, granite stones, laid with thick white mortar joints, trimmed with cast stone, which is sheltered by a steeply-pitched, slate roof. The mass of the chapel is emphasized by a gable-roofed, heavy, square tower near the eastern end and stone buttresses at the tower and chapel walls. A small, seventeen foot by twenty foot, one-story ell extends south from the crossing.

The principal entry, consisting of a heavy, round-headed, wooden door is located on the west elevation, while a secondary entry exists at the one-story ell. Fenestration consists primarily of round-headed windows of various sizes and a large circular window at the west elevation. All the windows are set with multicolored abstract squares, a hallmark of their creator, Charles J. Connick.

The interior finish of the chapel is simple with plastered walls and a barrel-vaulted ceiling supported by wooden trusses. All the chapel's furnishings, including doors, lighting fixtures and furniture, were designed by Cram and Ferguson.

Similarly, Cram and Ferguson achieved a unity of design for Greenlawn Cemetery by matching the walls, gates and outbuilding to Ellingwood Chapel. The Tool House, the stone walls along Nahant Road and High Street and the Francis H. Johnson Gate, echo the Norman-style of the chapel and are, likewise, constructed of random-size, granite stones laid with thick mortar joints.

The Tool House is set into the sharp rise of the rocky hillside behind the Chapel to the east. It is a low, unpretentious, gabled shed that yet mimics its parent building in the use of rough stones, heavy mortar and simple rounded Norman door and rectangular windows.

The Francis H. Johnson Gate at the cemetery's main entrance, on Nahant Road, combines a pointed stone peak with a generous Norman arch beneath it, falling away to stone shoulders on each side and blending into the continuous stone wall. Stone benches flank each side of the entry and wrought iron gates in a spear pattern open into the cemetery.

In the southeast corner of the cemetery, the Louisa Beal Gate (1919-1920) welcomes visitors with an equally sturdy, but less formal, Gothic Revival entry and wooden fence. Reminiscent of English churchyard lych gates, the main entry is also of rough stones in the manner of Ellingwood Chapel. A heavy wooden rail fence with dark-green, massive, carved posts, runs on each side of the gate forming the cemetery's southeastern edge, extending into the rocky hillside that rises behind Ellingwood Chapel.

## 1853 Town Meeting Appoints Cemetery Committee

None of the early churches had cemeteries and the only one in town is the Greenlawn Cemetery was owned and maintained by the town. In early days, there was a burial place near Pleasant Street, but it was practically private. A very early action of the Town, at the third Town Meeting in 1853, was the appointment of a committee on a town cemetery, consisting of David Johnson, Dexter Stetson and Walter Johnson. They reported at the Annual Meeting in March, 1854, and the report was referred again to a committee of five, consisting of the same three with Washington H. Johnson and Artemus Murdock. They were empowered to buy a "suitable piece of ground" for a cemetery.

At a March meeting in 1856, the committee reported the purchase from the heirs of Thomas H. Perkins, of a lot in Range Eleven, containing about two acres.

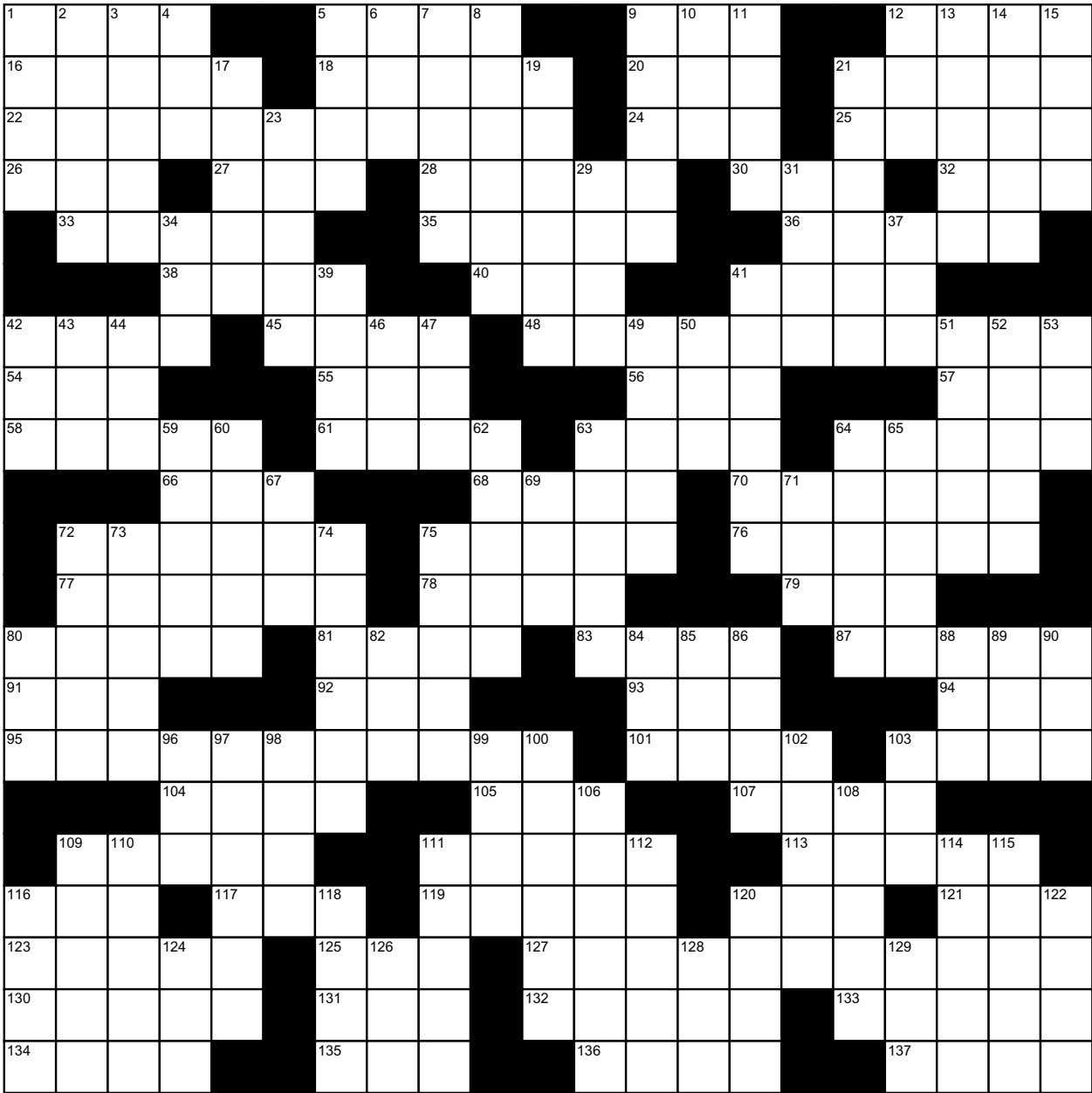
In 1858, a street was laid out from the highway to the cemetery and the place was named Greenlawn Cemetery. This street was exactly where the main avenue from Nahant Road runs today and entered the lot near the northwesterly end. The northeasterly side was a few feet northerly from where the main avenue now broadens out, to meet the circular part of the avenue. The two other sides were as they are now, on High Street southeasterly and along what was then a Tudor orchard southwesterly.

About this time, the Town provided money for the stone posts and the gates, which many people will remember, on this old line in eighty yards, or more, from Nahant Road.

Then came three additions to the area. First in 1879, came the extension northwesterly down to Kennedy Court. Second, in 1908, the purchase of the strip towards Nahant Road, about a hundred feet wide and from the Linehan's land up to, but not including, the top of the hill. Finally, in 1918, the inclusion of the land out to Nahant Road, part of which was occupied by the building first used as a schoolhouse and then a police station completed the additions.

## GLSS Advises "NO" Vote on Q 1

Greater Lynn Senior Service (GLSS) announced that it is advising voters of all ages to vote "No" on Question 1. "Question 1 on the November 4 ballot will have a significant, negative impact on services and programs, not just for older people, but almost everyone in Massachusetts, who relies on state or local services," said GLSS' Executive Director Ron Airey. "Moreover, Question 1 provides no alternative source of revenue, to help soften the blow that would be felt by thousands of our friends and neighbors."

According to the Secretary of State's summary, the proposed law would reduce the state personal income tax rate to 2.65% for all categories of taxable income, for the tax year beginning on, or after, January 1, 2009, and would eliminate the tax for all tax years beginning on, or after, January 1, 2010. "If voters repeal the state income tax on November 4, the state budget will have to be cut by roughly \$12 or \$13 billion," Airey noted.

"Overall, this is around a 45 percent cut to the state's \$28 billion budget." Dramatic cuts would be needed across the board, to state-funded services, everything from police and fire departments, to services for the elderly and disabled, to day care centers and public colleges and universities. "Just about everyone whose life is touched by state services will be hurt," he said.

If Question 1 passes, the following cuts would affect seniors: As many as 15,300 senior citizens could lose their home care services entirely; 3.4 million meals-on-wheels could be lost statewide; \$720 million in state and federal funds could be lost for nursing home care, affecting more than 14,400 seniors living in institutions; Nearly \$26 million in drug benefits for the elderly are in jeopardy.

"Question 1 could cause an enormous shift of burden from the income tax to the property tax," Airey said. "High property taxes are already an issue for many seniors in our area, and the passage of Question 1 would be devastating to seniors already struggling to remain in their homes, on low or fixed incomes." The ballot question is opposed by the Massachusetts Taxpayers Association, the Boston Chamber of Commerce, and Mass Home Care, along with many other community-based groups.

"It is difficult to pinpoint where the most damage will occur," Airey noted. "But there is no doubt that a \$13 billion cut in state revenue will be felt by just about every citizen in the Commonwealth, from students in need of college loans, to seniors in need of home-care services."

GLSS is the federally designated non-profit Area Agency on Aging and the Aging Services Access Point for the communities of Lynn, Lynnfield, Nahant, Saugus, and Swampscott. The organization provides a broad range of services—everything from homecare, to transportation, to home-delivered meals and more—to eligible residents age 60 and older and people with disabilities in those communities and beyond.
